COURSE OUTCOMES Through this course, students should

- 1. obtain an understanding of basic family forms and functions
- 2. become familiar with and develop an appreciation for the historical foundation of the American family structure as well as the cultural, economic, and political factors that currently shape the structure of families.
- 3. learn to recognize and understand patterns of interaction within families and the social aspects that affect such interaction.
- 4. gain the ability to sociologically analyze contemporary family issues.

Evaluation

Three examinations are given during the semester. All of these examinations are non-cumulative. They include objective and subjective questions that address the concepts discussed in class and in assigned readings.

In addition to the examinations, students must complete two papers. These assignments require students to apply sociological concepts to their own and others' families and family relationships. Specific information about the papers, including topics and due dates, can be found in the Paper Guidelines and Topics handouts. Each student also receives

a class participation/activity grades. The participation portion of the grade reflects a student's interaction in class. Each class period during which an individual provides substantive class discussion or contributions to group work increases this grade. Conversely, disruption (such as consistently arriving to class late), a lack of effort, or obvious inactivity (including sleeping) lowers the grade. The class activities portion of the grade reflects a student's efforts toward and completion of in-class assignments as well as performance on periodic "pop" quizzes.

To provide each student with a grade at the end of the semester. the the preceding factors are combined in the following manner.

exams	60% (20% each)
papers	30% (15% each)
class participation/activities	10%
