DRAWING I

Drawing is a discipline both artistic and technical in nature requiring a great deal of dedication, attention to detail and respect of process and materials. The final image is inextricably tied with the method of manufacture and the intellectual intensity of observation and analysis brought to bear in it's creation. In this course, students will be introduced to and master the age-old techniques of representational drawing.

STUDENT COMPETENCIES

Students will learn and practice:

- -expressive and descriptive qualities of line
- -creating form via chiaroscuro
- -analysis of form, space and surface
- -positive and negative form
- -additive and subtractive drawing
- -linear and atmospheric perspective
- -proportion and measuring
- -appropriate usage of various drawing media
- -visual observation and analysis skills
- -concept development
- -artistic terminology and nomenclature

ATTENDANCE

Attendance is compulsory. Learning occurs while doing, PARTICULARLY IN A STUDIO ENVIRONMENT, therefore, absence results in poor performance as well as a drop in the final grade. Unexcused absences will negatively affect your final grade: for each unexcused absence after three, three points will be deducted from the final grade. Excused absences will not be penalized. An excused absence is one which is caused by circumstances beyond your control and which can be officially verified in writing (i.e., auto accidents, doctor visits, family emergency, etc.) Attendance will be taken each class period. Missed information because of absence or tardiness is the responsibility of the student. Critiques occur periodically throughout the semester as particular projects and assignments are completed. Student participation in the critiques is required and evaluated.

GRADING

Each project is evaluated with at least one letter grade. Criteria will be explained for each class project, sometimes verbally, sometimes in writing. Supplies and resources required for projects are in the syllabus and are usually listed on the board. Final grades will be determined by converting the letter grades to numbers based on a 100-point system and averaging. The implications of absences will then be factored in. You are free to discuss your grades with the instructor at any time convenient to both during the semester. All projects are due as scheduled in class and for critique. Work submitted on time and for scheduled critiques may be remade and resubmitted by one week following the critique for a 3 point improvement in grade but will not have the benefit of a group critique. Works submitted late or not present at the scheduled critiques are not eligible for resubmission or for group critique. There is no extra credit work. Extra work beyond assignment requirements will be discouraged to allow for maximum concentration on principles involved. While this might seem principally a technical class, aesthetic considerations should be addressed, that is you should produce Artwork, this component too will play a role in your grade.
