Course Goals: Process Improvement develops students' ability to apply critical thinking and quantitative methods to unfamiliar processes. The course introduces a process based on Elihu Goldratt's theory of constraints, a largely non-quantitative method, and Six Sigma, introduced by William Smith, that relies on statistical methods..

Course Policies

Due Dates: Students who miss a due date without prior approval will receive a zero.

Attendance: I take attendance at the beginning of each class to:

- 1. Know which students are present and ready to work at the scheduled time and
- 2. Assist the Academic Affairs Office in financial aid matters when a student withdraws.

Students who are present at the scheduled starting time for at least 40 of 42 scheduled classes will receive 100 attendance points. Missing class or being late 10 more times, 13 in all, will mean 0 attendance points and the loss of a letter grade.

This is not a "cut" policy as I understand the term. Such policies reduce a student's grade after as few as three or four absences or tardies. Losing a letter grade under this policy means being absent or tardy at least 4 of 14 class weeks, 30% of scheduled classes.
