COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to explore the world of deviant behavior. Students will be introduced to the nature and functions of deviance, as well as the major theoretical approaches to the causes of deviant behavior. Through readings, lectures, and group discussions, students will investigate such topics as crime and punishment, societal reactions toward deviance, and the individual's response toward strain. When appropriate, Videos/DVDs will be used to help illustrate other forms of deviant behavior, including violence, ritualistic behavior, body modification, drug/alcohol abuse, and sexually deviant behavior.

GOALS:

- To identify deviance in its various forms throughout our society
- To develop an understanding of society's reactions toward deviant behavior
- To review and discuss major sociological theories that deal specifically with deviant behavior
- To gain empathy for those different than ourselves

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Scoring- The class will be based on a total of 400 points, with this breakdown:

Tests and quizzes will be based on information gathered from required reading, lecture notes, and video/DVD presentations. Topics for the paper/project will be assigned at a later date.
