ANCIENT AND MEDIEVAL PHILOSOPHY (PHIL 243)

CONTENT:

The course deals with the history of philosophy from the pre-Socratics to Aquinas. A special attention is given to the works of Plato, Aristotle, Plotinus, Avicenna, Maimonides and Aquinas. Themes include ethical concerns, nature of reality, and relationships of reason, religion and authority.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

At the end of the course, students are expected to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. to explain major philosophical themes in ancient and medieval periods;
- 2. to distinguish major characteristics of philosophy in ancient and medieval periods from those of philosophy in other periods;
- 3. to explore the views of major philosophers in ancient and medieval periods on the question of Being;
- 4. to discuss the relation between reality and knowledge in ancient and medieval periods;
- 5. to explore the ethical views of major philosophers in ancient and medieval periods.

GRADING FORMAT:

- 1. Participation (20 points);
- 2. Structured paper (20 points);
- 3. Research paper (8-15 pages; 30 points): research proposal (5 points) and first draft (5 points) of the paper are required prior to final submission (15 points);
- 4. Presentation on a book or a part of a book from the works of Plato, Aristotle, Plotinus, Avicenna, Maimonides, or Aquinas (15-20 minutes; 30 points): 10 points for a prepared paper; 10 points for actual presentation and 10 points for handling questions and comments;
- 5. Complete attendance (5 extra points).

Students will accumulate the points—there will be no conversion of points into grades—until the end of the semester. Below is the table of point conversion for the final grade:

PARTICIPATION:

Attending a lecture(s) on philosophy, whenever applicable, can also be counted toward increasing the participation grade. Complete attendance without any form of participation indicated above will give students a participation grade of no more four points.

a class with written justifiable reason(s) may be waived from absence if they write a report on the reading when they missed the class. Complete attendance does not guarantee a good participation grade.

PAPER SUBMISSIONS:

Assignments are posted electronically on the Blackboard. All papers—including (1) structured paper, (2) written material for presentation, (3) research proposal, (4) draft of research paper and (5) final research paper—should be electronically submitted through Blackboard on or before the indicated dates. If for some reason there is a problem with electronic submission, the printed copy of the paper should be submitted to the instructor's office on the same day. Late submissions will be downgraded for that specific assignment by one point per day.

Students are encouraged to rewrite the structured paper, proposal, and the draft of research paper. Final research papers cannot be rewritten. The rewritten papers are due within a week after the papers are electronically distributed. Since the grades of the rewritten papers can be better or worse than the originally submitted papers, the best grades will be counted toward the final.
