## **INTRODUCTION TO ISLAM**

#### **Contents:**

The course is a survey of the ideals and practices of Islam across its history. It includes ritual, theological, philosophical, mystical, ethical and political dimensions of Islam. Special attention is given to Islam's primary message and its implementation in the life of Muslims, and to Islam's depiction of Muslims and people of other beliefs.

## **Course Objectives:**

At the end of the course, students are expected to be able to:

- 1. describe the significance of the Qur'an and prophetic tradition in Islam;
- 2. understand Islam's primary mission and its universal principles;
- 3. explain the interaction of Islamic teaching with its cultural surroundings;
- 4. map major disciplines of Islamic intellectual tradition;
- 5. distinguish universal principles of Islam from their particular applications;
- 6. explain Islamic portrayal of other religions and their peoples;
- 7. explain major historical periods of Muslim ummah;
- 8. present some challenges Islam faces in the modern world.

## **Grading Format:**

- 1. Participation (20 points);
- 2. Two Structured papers (10 points each, totaling 20 points);
- 3. Research paper (7-15 pages; 30 points): research proposal (5 points); draft (5 points); and final submission (20 points);
- 4. Mid-term exam (10 points);
- 5. Final exam (20 points).

## **Extra Credits**

Extra credits may be added to the total grade for the following:

- 1. Having complete attendance (5 points);
- 2. Publishing an essay(s) on Islam in campus publications, magazines or newspapers (5 points).

## Attendance Policy:

Students are encouraged to attend all scheduled meetings for this course. An extra credit of 5 points will be awarded to those who have complete attendance. Students have the liberty to miss two classes without penalty. Those who miss more than two classes will be downgraded by 5

points of the total grade for each missed meeting after the two absences, unless they provide the instructor with a justified reason(s) in writing. The 5 points credit may be awarded to students who miss classes if the students provide the instructor with a justified reason(s) in writing and write a meaningful discussion on the reading(s) for those specific meetings.

#### Participation:

Students' participation is highly valued. Active participation includes any input that enables the achievement of the course objectives. It includes—but not limited to—making comments about the reading, asking questions about the reading or the themes under discussion, answering questions posed by the instructor or the class, and suggesting alternative views on the issues in class discussion. Participation in a lecture(s) related to Islam or engagement/observation in Muslim activities such as *iftar* and prayers, whenever applicable, can be counted toward increasing the participation grade. Complete attendance without any form of participation indicated above will give students a participation grade of no more than D.

#### Paper Submissions:

All papers—including (1) structured papers, (2) research proposal, (3) draft, (4) final research paper, and (5) rewrites and other reports/assignments where applicable—should be electronically submitted through the Blackboard's Assignment page or its Digital Drop Box on the indicated dates. If for some reason there is a problem with electronic submission on the Blackboard, the assignment should be sent via e-mail attachment or a printed copy of the paper should be submitted to the instructor's office on the same day. Late submissions will be downgraded for that specific assignment by one point per day.

Students are encouraged to rewrite all papers except final research papers. The final research papers cannot be rewritten. The rewritten papers are due within a week after the papers are electronically posted. Since the grades of the rewritten papers can be better or worse than the originally submitted papers, the best grades will be counted toward the final.

Students will accumulate the points—there will be no conversion of points into grades—until the end of the semester. Below is the table of point conversion for the final grade:
