Seminar in Personality/Social Psychology:

The Social Psychology of Emotion

Emotions—subjective feelings that prepare us for action—are an essential, undeniable part of what it means to be human. Our emotions have consequences for ourselves (we feel happy or sad, angry or disgusted) and for others (we love, we hate). Ironically, perhaps, contemporary psychology only recently "rediscovered" the important role emotions play in social life; we need passion as much as we do reason. To understand emotion in our own lives and social life generally, we will discuss current theory and empirical research drawn from personality and social psychology.

### **Course Requirements**

Attendance and participation. Our class is a seminar. Your active, engaged, and on-going participation is essential to the success of the class. To that end, I will be taking role daily. An undue number of absences will lower your final course grade.

*Short papers.* Two short (5 pages each) paper assignments are noted in the syllabus. These papers are meant to reflect your reactions to two specific readings (i.e., William James's thoughts on emotion, Hochschild's book on emotion work). Include APA style references on an attached References list. Be prepared to discuss your papers in class the day they are due (due dates are noted in the course schedule).

*Research paper*. Each student will write his or her own APA style empirical paper *or* literature review paper. If you choose the former option, then you should design and execute some research project that examines emotion from a social psychological perspective. You may work in a small group and I will help you to create an experiment, quasi-experiment, or field study addressing a topic in emotion. If you choose to write a review paper, then you need to systematically summarize some area of the emotion literature in social psychology or from a social psychological perspective.

Please note that I must know the nature of your paper (empirical or review) and the topical area no later than *February 11, 2008*. On that day, please submit a 1-page summary of your topic, any key references you have found, and whether the paper will be an empirical investigation or a review. We will discuss the research paper assignment in more detail during class.

You will write a 15 to 20 page (double-spaced, APA style) research paper on some topic in the social psychology of emotion. There are four steps to this project—the due dates for each step are noted in the course schedule.

Step 1. Submit a preliminary list of references on Wednesday, February 27<sup>th</sup>. Your list should contain *at least* 10 references (articles, books, book chapters). Please be sure your list is written in APA style. I anticipate your final paper will have 15 to 20 good quality references. By all means use PsycINFO to search for relevant articles, but keep in mind that sometimes the best approach is to go to the periodical room and examine recent issues of social psychology journals (try recent issues of the *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, Journal of Experimental Social Psychology, Personality and Social Psychology Bulletin, Current Directions in Psychological Science, Psychological Science*, among other journals that publish social psychological research). I've attached a complete list of social psychology journals at the end of this syllabus.

*Step 2.* Bring five copies of the outline for your paper to class on Wednesday, March 19<sup>th</sup>. Your outline should have a working title for the paper, your thesis statement (the paper's purpose), key sections pertaining to the literature review or empirical paper (with supporting references), etc. We will use some of class time that day for a writing workshop where we all look over the proposed outlines, make suggestions, etc. *Suggestion:* Take your outline to the Writing Center for peer feedback and make necessary changes before you share it with our class.

Step 3. Bring five copies of the rough draft of your paper to class on Monday, April 7<sup>th</sup>. Your rough draft should be based on your outline (which may have been substantially revised) and include a title page, Abstract page, the literature review or empirical paper sections (i.e., introduction, Method, Results, Discussion), References, and any other necessary materials. We will use some of class time that day for a writing workshop where we all look over the rough drafts in order to offer critical comments designed to improve the paper. *Suggestion:* Make an appointment at the Writing Center to have a tutor go over and improve your draft before you bring it to class. After you revise your draft based on class comments, take the revision back to the Writing Center for additional comments.

Step 4. Submit the final paper to me in class on Wednesday, April 16<sup>th</sup>.

Policy on late papers or paper-related assignments-please read this carefully. Late papers or assignments related to the research paper (topic, reference list, outline, rough draft, final paper) will be accepted for no more than three days after the due date. The penalty for a late paper is 1 complete letter grade reduction for each day a paper is late (the first drop in a grade occurs once I collect the assignment, usually at the start of class). After the three days are over, a grade of "0" will be given for the missed assignments. No exceptions will be made to this rule, even in the case of legitimate and documented excuses, technical difficulties (e.g., computer or car), weather issues, and personal problems. *You should be working on your project on an on-going basis so that you will always have something to submit.* You may *not* email an assignment to me unless we discuss it and I inform you that I will accept it. I want hard copies of all work to be submitted by you in class. For example, I will not accept an assignment that is emailed to me while the class is meeting.

A missed exam will be recorded as a zero (0) grade. Make-up exams will be given at my discretion, and valid evidence for the absence will be required (e.g., emergency, documented medical excuse).
