Catalog/Course Description:

Course Description: Advances in medical technology have enabled individuals to live longer lives, orchestrate their own healthcare, and participate in end of life decisions. Inherent within end of life issues are cultural decisions, ethical issues, Anticipatory grief, palliative care, loss, and bereavement.

This course will use a holistic approach to examine cultural considerations/rituals, religious influences, loss, grief, socioeconomic challenges, end-of- life physical concerns across the lifespan. Preparing for and caring for the individual/family at the time of death will be explored.

Course Objectives: Upon completion of the course, the student will:

- 1. Explore theories and concepts related to grief, bereavement, mourning, and loss across the lifespan.
- 2. Describe ethical and moral dilemmas inherent within the context of end of life care.
- 3. Discuss the dimensions of cultural beliefs and the influence of spirituality within the context of palliative care.
- 4. Contrast anticipatory grief, loss, mourning, and bereavement across the lifespan.
- 5. Examine coping mechanisms utilized by individuals at the end of life.
- 6. Synthesize concepts/theories from psychology and religion to address authentic case studies relative to end of life issues.
