II. Course Goals

Review of basic grammar, continuous vocabulary building, and reading of assigned Latin prose and poetry, combined with translation, analysis, and discussion in class, are designed to enable students to read and appreciate at sight Classical Latin texts of moderate difficulty and to be aware of the cultural context.

IV. Attendance and Assignment Policies

- Overdue written assignments and missed quizzes will be assigned a grade of zero except in special circumstances.
