



NURSING 210.2 B: DIMENSIONS OF HEALTH CARE Fall 2008

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Catalog/Course Description:

An exploration of health care in the 21st century and beyond. Health and delivery systems will be analyzed through perspectives in economics, public policy, ethics, demographics, and evolving global issues. Course open to non-nursing majors.

Prerequisites: None

Course Objectives:

- 1. Analyze the concepts of health and healing.
- 2. Discuss the impact of health care changes on the consumer worldwide.
- 3. Examine legal and ethical issues related to health policy.
- 4. Examine the impact of economics on health care.
- 5. Explore the role of the health care worker and the consumer in influencing health policy.

Course Requirements:

I. Scholarly Paper

The Scholarly Paper is a synthesis of two course requirements – the Health Issue Paper and the Health Policy Paper. The topic for the paper is to reflect issues in college student health, and Leading Health Indicators for Healthy People 2010.

Health Issue Paper

Health Issue Reference List:

The Health Issue Reference List for this paper is due October 10^{th} . It is to include at least 5 references, including at least 2 research articles. References are to come from PubMed, HealthSource, and CINAHL Databases, available through Reeves or Estes Libraries. Only one website from *.gov* or *.org* resources may be used unless approved by the instructor.

This reference list requirement is to be in APA format with a title page and running head. Margins are to be 1 inch for all borders and text font should be Times Roman, 12 point.

Health Issue Paper:

The Health Issue Paper is due October 24th. It is to be at least 5 double-spaced pages, in addition to the title page, abstract, and references pages. Margins are to be 1 inch for all borders and text font is Times Roman, 12 point. There should be a running head that is a shortened version of the title.

The Health Issue Paper should address the health issue according to the framework below: A. Identify one major health issue of interest of concern to you.

- B. Explain the significance of this issue and why it is important to address.
- C. Describe whether this is a health issue from a local, national and/or global perspective
- D. Identify what population(s) are most vulnerable to this health issue
- E. Explain what makes the population(s) vulnerable.
- F. Select and explain a theory of health behavior change appropriate for the identified population of the health issue.
- G. Indicate current and future effects of this health issue on local, national, and/or the global community.

Health Policy Paper

Health Policy Reference List:

The Health Policy Reference List for this paper is due November 7th. It is to include at least 3 additional references than were in the Health Issues Paper. References are to come from PubMed, HealthSource, and CINAHL Databases, available through Reeves or Estes Libraries. Only one website from *.gov* or *.org* resources may be used unless approved by the instructor.

This reference list requirement is to be in APA format with a title page and running head. Margins are to be 1 inch for all borders and text font should be Times Roman, 12 point.

Health Policy Paper:

The Health Policy Paper is due Wed., Nov. 21th. It is to be at least 5 double-spaced pages, in addition to the title page, abstract, and references pages. Margins are to be 1 inch for all borders and text font is Times Roman, 12 point. There should be a running head that is a shortened version of the title.

The Health Policy Paper should address the health topic according to the framework below:

- A. Suggest at least two possible alternative policies to address the health issue within the vulnerable populations(s) identified in the first paper.
- B. For each policy alternative explain:
 - The goal of the policy
 - Who will implement this policy
 - How it will be implemented
 - What population is targeted
 - Who will pay for this implementation of this policy.
- C. Identify the stakeholders in this policy, i.e. who will and who will not support the proposed policies.
- D. Incorporate research findings that would suggest that the proposed policies would be effective.
- E. Select three of the following criteria: quality, access to care, fairness, cost, autonomy, administrative feasibility, or political feasibility. Discuss how each policy does or does not address the three criteria.
- F. Select one of the alternatives to recommend and explain why you have chosen this option.

Scholarly Paper

Finally, each student will synthesize the two papers – the Health Issue and Policy Papers, combining them logically into one Scholarly Paper. The paper is to be 10-12 pages, including the title page, abstract and references. Levels of headings are to be used appropriately. The final draft is to be submitted electronically and is due Dec. 10th.

II. Global Health Presentation

Students will collaborate to present information on an assigned global health topic. This group presentation will involve reviewing literature and related research, preparing an outline and recommended readings, presenting the topic through the use of PowerPoint, and facilitating class discussion. The health presentation should reference materials from Healthy People 2010, Centers for Disease Control, and the World Health Organization.

- A. The instructor will divide the student group into small groups of 3-4 students and assign one of the following topics to be presented during class time:
 - Complementary/alternative health care
 - HIV/AIDS
 - Disease epidemics
 - Maternal and child health
 - Cancer prevention
 - Environmental risk
- B. At least two weeks before the presentation, each group is to schedule time to meet all together with the instructor with a formal outline, plan and reference list to be used for the presentation.
- C. At least one week before the presentation, at least two readings are to be given to all class members (electronically or posted on Blackboard).
- D. The actual presentation should include the following:
 - Overview of health topic and related health problems
 - Discuss the significance of topic for global health
 - Indicate the impact nurses and other health care providers have in resolving global health concerns
 - Provide data on incidence and prevalence of related health problems
 - Summarize relevant information on the topic (1-2 page handout)
 - Suggest policies that should be enacted, nationally and/or globally
- E. Grades for the Global Health Presentation will be based on quality, accuracy, organization, completeness, grammar/spelling, handouts/readings, and presentation effect. Generally each member of the group will receive the same grade on this requirement. *If, however, a student does not contribute equally and/or responsibly in preparing and giving the presentation, a different grade may be assigned to that student.*

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- F. The instructor will divide the student group into small groups of 3-4 students and assign one of the following topics to be presented during class time:
 - Complementary/alternative health care

- HIV/AIDS
- Disease epidemics
- Maternal and child health
- Cancer prevention
- Environmental risk
- G. At least two weeks before the presentation, each group is to schedule time to meet all together with the instructor with a formal outline, plan and reference list to be used for the presentation.
- H. At least one week before the presentation, at least two readings are to be given to all class members (electronically or posted on Blackboard).
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 - Overview of health topic and related health problems
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- J. Grades for the Global Health Presentation will be based on quality, accuracy, organization, completeness, grammar/spelling, handouts/readings, and presentation effect. Generally each member of the group will receive the same grade on this requirement. *If, however, a student does not contribute equally and/or responsibly in preparing and giving the presentation, a different grade may be assigned to that student.*

III. Quizzes

There will be quizzes based on the textbook readings assigned for the course. The quiz average will be worth 5% of the course grade.

IV. Exams

Midterm Exam

The midterm exam will includes essays as well as objective test items (multiple choice, fill in, matching, etc.) The midterm examination will be a take-home exam, due by $4:00 \text{ p.m. on October } 3^{\text{rd}}$.

Final Exam

The final exam will be based on material from the global health presentation, PowerPoint slides and handouts. It will be given during finals' week in the time assigned by the Registrar.

V. Class Participation

The class participation requirement will be graded based on the following criteria:

- A (95) Can be counted on to offer constructive comments related to class readings; makes useful contributions to group discussions; raises questions that stimulate discussion; engages in dialogue with many other classmates about course material; actively participates in small group discussions
- B (85) Will make constructive comments if called on by instructor; contributes to group discussion; has asked some questions that facilitate group discussion; engages in dialogue with other classmates about course material; actively participates in small group discussions
- C (75) Attends regularly; occasionally raises questions and makes comments related to course material; participates in small group discussions
- D (55-65) Does not attend all class sessions; passive; rarely makes contributions to class or small group discussions
