Catalog/Course Description:

An introduction to the disciplines of nursing with a framework of the past leading into futuristic nursing concepts. Professional nursing is explored through examination of theoretical models with an emphasis on systems and caring. Professional ethics and practice standards will serve to guide the delivery of nursing care to individuals and groups.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Examine the evolution of nursing as a profession.
- 2. Differentiate legal, ethical, and professional aspects rooted in nursing.
- 3. Explore varying theoretical models as organizing frameworks for nursing.
- 4. Describe concepts of systems, professional values/standards and their application to the nursing profession.
