General Education Statement

The course is designed with several fundamental perspectives. It will serve as an introduction to the theoretical framework from which the Roman Catholic Church defines itself, i.e.; Historically, Dogmatically, Spiritually, Liturgically, Legally, Morally, etc. this will be attempted by exploring the oral and written traditions and how they are applicable to contemporary understanding and appreciation of said institution. A second focus is the multiple realms of application for these reference points, i.e.; several contemporary issues will be explored. The student learning outcomes:

- a. Recognize that institutions [people] are typically more complex than they appear to be and that informed decision-making requires interdisciplinary understanding;
- Grapple with their own misunderstandings and prejudices to formulating an appreciation for this institution as well as any other institution;

c. Experience a heightened awareness and an appreciation for discernment, criticism and argument concerning any institution of the global community.
