The principal subject we will address in this course is the proliferation of nuclear weapons. Proliferation can take different forms: (1) the accumulation and improvement of weapons by states that already have them ("vertical"), (2) the acquisition of weapons by new states that do not have them ("horizontal"), and (3) the acquisition of weapons by non-state or terrorist groups. Vertical proliferation is generally associated with the Cold War, but re-occurs in the post-Cold War in efforts by nuclear weapons states to improve the sophistication, rather than the numbers, of their weapons. Since September 11, 2001, attention has shifted to the latter two forms of proliferation -- horizontal proliferation and proliferation to non-state actors. The course will reflect this shift.

The course will examine various proposals, institutions, and policies that attempt to deal with or prevent proliferation. Historically, vertical proliferation has been countered by "arms control" efforts, a process that can either be a step in the direction of disarmament or an alternative to disarmament. Horizontal proliferation has been approached principally through the standards set by the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty (NPT) and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) whose main goal is to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons to non-nuclear weapon states. Some aspects of the NPT have been extended to deal with the proliferation involving non-state actors such as efforts to improve the physical protection of nuclear materials and to limit access to nuclear technology. Since 9/11, the new concept of "counter-proliferation" has been introduced; it refers to the use of intelligence information, interdiction, and the use of coercive or preemptive force.

This course has two broad purposes: to define and delineate the problem of nuclear proliferation and to examine its roots, institutions, evolution, current status, and challenges to the nuclear nonproliferation regime in which the NPT lies at its core. We will also discuss the prospects for a "nuclear renaissance", i.e., the anticipated growth in nuclear power generation and the implications for weapons proliferation. The course will have a strong policy-oriented focus.

Students are responsible for attending all classes, to read the assignments prior to class, to follow current developments in nuclear and nuclear related issues, and to come to class ready to participate actively in class discussion. Each student will prepare a short (NMT 10 pages) analytical paper on a topic relevant to the course, after agreeing on the topic with me by the fourth class session. Each student will

also prepare a draft Opinion Editorial (op-ed.) for submission to a newspaper advocating an aspect of nonproliferation policy. The piece should be between 600 and 800 words and is due on or before the tenth class session. The final few sessions will be devoted, in part (NMT 5 minutes), to brief oral presentations of student papers. The final grade will be determined primarily by the quality of class participation, two short written products (paper & op-ed.), the presentation of the research paper, and a final examination. One question on the final exam will be: draft a Memorandum to the President outlining the three most important issues facing U.S. nuclear nonproliferation today.
