<u>Course Description:</u> Tasks and subject matter of philosophy, including major theories of reality, knowledge, religion, morality and justice. Attention to classic philosophical texts as primary reading sources.

Course Objectives:

- A. To acquaint the student with a variety of philosophies and ideas both historical and recent that influence contemporary understandings and values.
- B. To broaden one's philosophical perspectives by studying contrasting views.
- C. To develop the habit of considering philosophically, in agreement for or against, a solution to a problem.
- D. To develop the ability to think critically and logically, and to evaluate ideas.
- E. To formulate an argument and support it with reasonable justification.
- F. To ability to reflect and philosophize concerning life and its meaning.
- G. To relate the discipline of philosophy to other academic disciplines and to see how these disciplines impact philosophical thinking.

Course Evaluation:

Students will be evaluated on the following items:

A. Reflection Papers (40%)

A series of three (3) original reflection papers will be assigned. In these papers you will address specific assigned question relates to the philosophical area of study. With reference to the assigned class materials, you will answer the question as completely as possible in 2-3 pages. They will be graded on the quality of your philosophical argumentation and presentation. They will also serve as the basis for in-class discussion.

B. Exams (40%)

There will be a take home midterm and an in-class final each worth 20%. The Midterm will be 2-3 pages in length while the final will be in a Blue Book. They will be evaluated using the same criteria as the papers.

C. Class Participation (20%)

Discussion is at the heart of the philosophical enterprise, therefore active participation in the class and class discussion are required.
