### **COURSE GOALS:**

During this course I hope that you will:

1. Review basic Latin grammar.
2. Build vocabulary.
3. Improve your ability to read and appreciate Classical Latin prose texts of moderate difficulty.
4. Increase your familiarity with major aspects of Roman culture.
