Catalog: Course Description:

This nursing elective exams the pharmacological process utilized by nurses including knowledge of medications, administration of medications, and medication calculations in patients throughout the lifespan. Pharmacological issues, over the counter medications, and herbal medication use will be examined. Reactions, compliancy, and other patient responses to pharmacological therapies will be discussed.

Course Objectives:

1. Exam the pharmacological process utilized in the safe administration of medications to client.
2. Explore pharmacological issues related to client care.
3. Analyze ethical and legal principles associated with medication administration.

Required Text:

Course Requirements:

1. Class attendance is an expectation. Students are expected to be prepared for all class meetings. The student should have completed assignments prior to attending class. Students are responsible for obtaining materials available on Blackboard **prior** to class.

1. Papers must be typed according to APA style (6th Ed.).
2. Assignments are expected on or before their due dates. Five points per day will be deducted from the grade if assignments are handed in late.
