Purpose of Course

The purpose of this course, in a broad sense, is to provide you with answers to the questions: What is deviance and what does it have to do with me? In order to answer these questions as fully as possible in a one-semester course, we will look at various theories, concepts, and methods sociologists use to describe and explain deviance. By doing this, you will develop a sociological perspective of human behavior that will make you see sociology all around you. This way of looking at the world is called the sociological imagination, which I'm not sorry to say, most former students tell me they can't shake, even 10 years later.

Get ready for a sociological adventure around our deviant world!

- 4. Apply concepts and theories to a particular case, including your own experience, using your skills of analysis, synthesis, and evaluation. In the process, you will be engaging in abstract reasoning.
- 5. Logically organize ideas according to social science criteria in written assignments.

Policies

Attendance

While I do not grade your attendance directly, I do take attendance and it is clearly counted indirectly in your grades. I can't stress this enough. I'll be straight up. Students who miss class do not do as well as those who attend on a regular basis. I try to make class as interesting as possible so attending isn't painful.

When you miss class, you get out of sync. Missing class means missing notes and discussions that become part of your exams. You also might miss discussions about topics or further explanations about work due. Also, in-class work can't be made up.

Due Dates

The due dates for various assignments and tests are in the schedule. I should tell you now that make-up exams are tough and I wouldn't recommend them. You need to hand in any homework or papers at the beginning of class or they will be considered late. Late work will be reduced one letter grade per day, not per class. It's not fair to the other students who hand in their work on time if I accept late work without a penalty.

I will not tolerate cheating or plagiarism. You will receive an automatic F for the course.

Withdrawal

The last day to withdraw from the class is November 6th. After that time, you will receive a grade.

Methods of Assessment

Your exams will consist of essay questions. You will need to recall facts, discuss and explain concepts, apply your knowledge using illustrations and examples, and analyze information by comparing and contrasting various concepts.

As a group and individually, you will do various assignments during class such as reaction papers, example specifications, debates, and discussions.

You will write a short paper based on your own deviance. 5% I Am Deviant

You will bring 4 examples of deviance to class. 10% I See Deviance

You will be given other homework assignments throughout the semester such as questionnaires. 10% Homework

We Investigated Deviance = 15%

As a group, you will present your findings of deviance to the class.

Directions for the Deviance Projects

I See Deviance

This is an ongoing project throughout the semester. You will find 4 examples of deviance from different venues. Bring them into class on their due dates (see schedule) to discuss with the class. During their discussion you will relate them to information you learned in class and from your book.

I Am Deviant

You will violate a folkway in front of your family, friends, or strangers and report what folkway you violated, how you violated it, and the reaction of those around you. If you don't get a reaction, you must either do it again or pick another folkway to violate until you get a reaction.

We Are Deviant

After being assigned a group, you will plan and perform a deviant act in public all of you are willing to participate in. You will be performing the act as a group in public, i.e. each of you will be deviant in the same way. You may only violate folkways, not mores. While planning the act, be sure you think about how to apply the concepts of deviance you have learned to the act.

Your group will decide upon and organize your group's deviant act including the time and place during class time and discuss your project with me. Performance of the act will take place during the week of . Class will not be held on so all members of the group will have a compatible time to perform your act.

Each member of the group will then write a paper individually about the planning and performance of the deviant act. Directions for the paper will be handed out when groups are formed.

We Investigated Deviance

After being assigned a group, you will decide upon and research a specific act now labeled as deviant perpetrated against a minority group. Here are some possible choices or you can come up with one on your own (with my permission): Jim Crow laws, sexual harassment, employment discrimination, holocaust, or hate crimes against a particular group. Your group will present their findings on the last day of class. More specific directions will be handed out when groups are formed.
