Course Outcomes

Upon completing this course, students should be able to

- 1. distinguish between aspects of sex and gender and characterize various relationships between the two.
- 2. consider gender as a social construction, recognizing the forces involved in gender socialization.
- 3. compare and contrast male and female lives, lifestyles and gender roles across the world.

- 4. apply relevant sociological theories to issues of gender relations
- 5. understand the bases for, manifestations of, and results of sex and gender inequality in various social institutions.

Three non-cumulative quizzes assess student understanding of the basic concepts discussed in class and in assigned readings.

Each quiz consists of one essay question. Answers are approximately one handwritten page in length.

During the semester, each student must complete two exploration/observation papers and one term paper. The exploration papers require students to use their awareness of gender issues to analyze various social contexts. The term paper serves as the course's "final experience". As part of this assignment, students must complete a peer evaluation of a classmate's paper as well as give a short (5 minute) presentation regarding their own topics. A description of the requirements for all of these papers, as well as relevant due dates, appears in the "Guidelines for Papers."

Each student also receives a class participation/class activities grade. The participation portion of the grade reflects students' interaction in class. Providing substantive class discussion and contributing to groupwork increases this grade. Conversely, disruption (including consistently arriving to class late), a lack of effort, and obvious inactivity (including sleeping) lowers the grade. The class activities portion of the grade reflects a student's efforts toward and completion of in-class assignments and exercises.

The preceding factors will be combined in the following manner to determine students' course grades.
