## Required Texts

### Goals

- To write and aurally identify all triads, including inversions.
- To read and write in alto and tenor clef, in addition to bass and treble clef.
- To spell all seventh chords and inversions.
- To demonstrate knowledge of scales and all modes.
- To identify simple melodic and harmonic intervals.
- To identify simple harmonic progressions (I-IV-V) and play (I-vi6-IV6/4-V6/5-I) in all major keys.
- To sing and identify all simple intervals.
- To sight-sing diatonic melodies using moveable 'do.'
- To perform and hear rhythms, including compound meters, ties and syncopation.
- To aurally notate diatonic melodies and rhythms.
- To take down two part dictations.
- To score read at least 2 parts at one time on the piano.
- To conduct standard patterns in 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 while sight-singing.

### Attendance/Class Participation (20%)
