### Requirements and Information:

- 1. Reading assigned material and being prepared to discuss and role play in class. Class participation will be a significant factor in grading.
- 2. Tests: There will be three tests and one final examination. Questions will include a variety of modalities. Test dates will be: **February 9, March 4, and April 6, 2010.** The date of the final exam will be determined at a later date. Make-up tests will not be given without a documented and appropriate reason. If the make-up test is given, it will be different from the original test.
- 3. Class attendance and participation is essential to learning. Students who have more than two unexcused absences will drop one grade level for each missed class for example, a B to a B-, etc. Excused absences will include illness, family emergency, or job interview. Documentation is requested for excused absences.
- 4. Grading: The final grade will be based on the average score of the exams and, if done, the paper. Class participation can improve the grade by as much as three points, based on regularity and quality. The instructor reviews participation at midterm and at the end of the semester. Points will be added to the final grade dependent upon that evaluation.
- 5. The Academic Honesty Policy outlined in the Student Handbook will be strictly adhered to in all situations.
- 6. Office Hours: The Instructor is available Tue and Thurs a half hour before each class. Help is best if sought early. Talk to the Instructor before or after class or email to set up an appointment for other times.

- 4. At least six sources (books, journals or news magazines) besides the textbook are to be used.
- 5. The paper may be turned in no later than **April 14, 2010.**
- 6. The format given above must be strictly adhered to with each area covered in the body of the paper.
