Course Description:

The process of critical thinking as a basis for open inquiry into assumptions, beliefs, and values about the discipline of nursing will be analyzed for nursing in a dynamic, multidisciplinary healthcare environment. Professional, historical, and socio-cultural issues, as well as ethical and legal standards, will be discussed within the context of healthcare challenges of the 21st century.

Course Objectives

- 1. Describe the evolution of professional nursing, nursing process and nursing theory.
- 2. Examine socio-cultural perspectives of health and health promotion.
- 3. Explain the process of inquiry and critical thinking in making decisions for evidence-based nursing care.
- 4. Explore nursing's role in promoting safe and quality care within a changing health care environment.
- 5. Develop an understanding of accountability as a member of the multidisciplinary health care team.
- 6. Recognize the importance of performance standards for professional and ethical practice.

This course provides an introduction to the process of knowledge acquisition in relation to nursing and health care concepts. The focus is on developing student's intellectual capabilities as independent thinkers. Critical thinking is a basis for open inquiry into assumptions, beliefs and values about one's self in relation to human caring, nursing, and health care. Students will utilize a variety of active learning strategies to explore concepts and issues related to nursing and health care.

...and what does this really mean?

Most of the thinking that we have developed has occurred rather effortlessly. There are many factors that have affected how we think; some of which are from word of mouth as occurs in the family setting, others are from television; movies, or the popular press. Learning to think critically involves the practice of skills consciously and deliberately in order to take charge of your thinking. The class will focus on processes used in critical inquiry; therefore, the classes and assignments will be focused on active learning processes. Nursing and health care issues will be utilized as a focus for developing critical analysis thinking skills.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Class attendance is an expectation. Students are expected to be prepared and attend all class meetings. This includes completing necessary assignments prior to attending class. Students who are not prepared for class may not be able to meet course standards and therefore are at risk for course failure. Arriving late to class is a distraction to those attending the class and will not be tolerated. The instructor reserves the right to deduct points off the student's final course grade after the seconded late arrival. Student will have 2 points deduced for each 5 minutes late and each following late arrivals.
- 2. If unable to attend a class, please contact the instructor via email, a minimum of one (1) hour prior to the start of the class session. Failure to notify the instructor will result in one point off the final course grade. Absence due to illness requires written verification from a licensed physician or nurse practitioner. For each unexcused absence, the student course grade will be lowered one letter grade (i.e.: from an A to A-). Holiday travel, routine medical appointments, and personal family vacations are not acceptable reasons to be absent from class or required learning activities. Students are responsible for obtaining any notes, handouts, or other class items from classmates. Students are encouraged to also review the Attendance Policy in Nursing Student Handbook.
- 3. Use of a computer, basic PC literacy, and Internet access are required.

- 4. **A Course Blackboard** is used for supplemental instruction in this course. Students are responsible for checking the Blackboard every 2 days for announcements and information posted there. Students experiencing difficulty with accessing the College network are accountable for seeking resolution from the CIT Help Desk within 24-48 hours.
- 5. **Completion of the course evaluation** (electronically available) before the last class meeting day of the term is required. This is an anonymous system required by the College in all courses. - 3. <u>Plagiarism</u> is the intentional use of another's words or ideas as your own. This can range from using another individual's direct words or changing the words slightly (paraphrasing) without the appropriate citation to purchasing a paper from the Internet or a professional writing service. Refer to the **Moravian College Academic Honesty**Policy in the Student Handbook. APA format is required for all written assignments.
- 4. Students are encouraged to participate in the full range of the college community programs, events, and sports. These events are routinely scheduled to begin at 4:00 PM; therefore, students should not request to leave class early to participate in extra curricula events.
- 5. Instructor absence In the event of acute illness of the instructor, a substitute teacher will cover the class or an alternative will be assigned via Blackboard.
