Through this course, students should

- understand the central ideas that define the field of sociology, it's methodology, its major theorists, and their contributions
- 2. examine social trends, their evolution, and their effects and implications for social change upon institutions as well as upon individuals

- 3. increase their knowledge and comprehension of the changing compositions, culture and structure of the United States and societies worldwide.
- 4. increase their understanding of and sensitivity to inequality and cross-cultural issues.

Evaluation

Four quizzes are given during the semester. Each quiz will take place during the first 30 minutes of class on the scheduled dates. The quizzes are non-cumulative and include objective and subjective questions that address the concepts discussed in class and in assigned readings.

In addition to the quizzes, students must write two papers, each three to four pages in length. These assignments require students to apply sociological concepts to their own lives and the lives of others. Specific information about the papers, including topics and due dates, can be found in the "Guidelines for Papers."

At the end of the semester, students demonstrate their abilities to recognize and apply sociological concepts with a final examination activity. During the course's scheduled final examination period, students will watch and identify aspects of sociology in a popular film. Additional details about this activity will be given shortly before the end of the semester.

Each student also receives a class participation/activities grade. The participation portion of the grade reflects the student's interactions in class. Each class during which an individual provides substantive contributions to class discussion or exercises increases this grade. Conversely, disruption (such as consistently arriving late for class), a lack of effort, or obvious inactivity (including sleeping) lowers the grade. The activities portion of the grade reflects a student's efforts toward completion of in-class assignments as well as performance on periodic "pop" quizzes.

The preceding factors are combined in the following manner to determine students' course grades.

QUIZZES 40%(10% each)

PAPERS FINAL EXAM A

30% (15% each)

FINAL EXAM ACTIVITY 20% CLASS PARTICIPATION/ACTIVITIES 10%
