COURSE DESCRIPTION

The physical, psychological, relational, and cultural aspects of sexuality influence us from before birth through death. This course will employ interactive class work, lecture, and readings to increase your understanding of lifespan human sexuality; to engage you in critical thinking about sexual messages and issues; to help you identify and critique you sexual values and attitudes; and to enable them to make informed relational and sexual decisions. Due to the nature of the subject matter, classroom discussion and educational materials may incorporate language and images that will challenge your comfort and attitudes.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, you will

- Gain a broader and deeper understanding of human sexuality from a biopsychosocial perspective
- Critically reflect upon your sexual values, experiences, attitudes and beliefs
- Understand diverse sexual attitudes and behaviors
- Increase your knowledge about sexual health and behaviors

ASSIGNMENTS

Due dates and readings are listed in the Course Assignment Calendar, which will be distributed the first week of class. You are expected to complete the each day's readings/assignments prior to class.

Format for all assignments: White paper, typed double spaced in 12-point Times Roman font. 1" margins on all sides. Conserve paper: You may print double sided, and you may recycle paper by drawing a slash through the previously used side. Staple multiple pages at the top left corner. Your name or ID# should be on every assignment. Edit and proofread, as sloppiness will affect your grade.

Submit all assignments on the due date in your personal folder. If you will be absent, you may email me your work by the start of the class period. Late assignments, even if emailed later on the day they are due, will lose two (2) points per day, including weekends. Please note that romantic difficulties, busy Computer Lab printers, and demanding work schedules do not count as extenuating circumstances.

Assignment #1: JOURNAL

The journal consists of 8 journal entries (approx. 300-words/1 full page) entries typed and double-spaced. Answer the assigned question <u>and</u> briefly react to one of the week's reading assignments. You are not required to reveal details about your personal sexual behaviors or interests.

Assignment #2: DISCOVERING OPTIMAL SEXUALITY

Read the article, "Building Blocks toward Optimal Sexuality," which is posted on Blackboard. Address the answer the questions on the assignment sheet in 3-5 pages.

Assignment #3: Reaction to "China's Changing Sexual Landscape" Lecture

Nov. 16 -- Attend "China's Changing Sexual Landscape" lecture from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m., in the UBC Room within the HUB. Write a 1-page reaction to the lecture. Do not summarize the lecture; rather, give your reaction to it.

Assignment #4: PERSONAL EXPERIENCE ESSAY

Experience something related to sexuality for the first time, and write a 5-8 page paper about your experience. Describe the experience, explain why you chose it, and address whether it differed from or met your expectations, how it related to your values, how it challenged your thinking, etc. The experience you choose should be challenging or eye-opening to you in some way. However, you are <u>not</u> required to participate in sexual activities or to do anything that would compromise your values or morals.

You may attend a meeting of the campus' Spectrum group or be tested for sexually transmitted infections (STIs). You may choose to explore art, media, or literature, or you may discuss a course-related topic with a loved one. Your grade will depend in part on your willingness to think deeply about how your sexual values and morals affected your choice of experience. Respect the potential for personal growth with this assignment. Do not pick an experience because it is easy; pick one that will teach you something about yourself.

A one-page appendix to your paper will feature cited academic research on the subject of your experience, i.e., if you are getting tested for STIs for the first time, you will include cited data about STIs, transmission rates, testing and/or treatments. Academic research excludes wiki pages, popular magazines, About.com, etc. A description of type of reference works is posted in Blackboard.

After submitting your topic, you will have 4 weeks to conduct preliminary research and change your topic, if you wish, but you must submit your new topic to me in writing. You may change your topic once. Do not submit a paper with a note saying, "I was unable to find information on...so I decided to write about..." PLAN AHEAD. I will only accept papers on the topic you designated earlier in the semester, unless there are extenuating circumstances you discuss with me well in advance of the due date.

If you have concerns about this assignment, contact me immediately.

MIDTERM EXAMINATION

The mid-term exam will be based on assigned readings in the textbook, assigned websites in the syllabus, and classroom learning. You will receive a test booklet in which to write your answers. The questions will be a mix of matching terms, fill-in, labeling (anatomy), and short answers.

FINAL EXAMINATION

The final exam will be based on assigned readings in the textbook, assigned websites in the syllabus, and classroom learning. The exam will be posted on Blackboard, and you will complete the exam independently before emailing it back to me on the scheduled final exam date.
