The goal of this seminar is to examine, analyze, and discuss music and multimedia works of political protest and satire with particular emphasis on banned and controversial works. These works include *Le Roman de Fauvel* and Dmitri Shostakovich's *The Nose*. Coursework will also include student multimedia presentations of preferred individual topics.
