*Extra credit will be offered for the successful completion of the four ATI Focused RN Medical Surgical Assessment Series Reviews (otherwise known as Targeted Med-Surg 2010). Students completing all four (4) reviews with a score of 90% or greater, will receive five (5) points added to their **Exam #3** grade. See statement below.

GRADING POLICY:

- 1. Assignments are expected on or before their due date. Five points per day will be deducted from grade if assignments are handed in late.

- 3. Attendance is a requirement for classroom and clinical components of the course, therefore faculty members will use their discretion to deduct points from the final course grade for any unexcused absence(s). Five tenths (.5) of a point will be deducted for each unexcused absence.
- 4. **Lateness** Faculty members will use their discretion to deduct points from the final course grade for any lateness. Four incidences of lateness will equate to 1 absence, deductions will be made according to the attendance statement above.

It is within the instructors' purview to apply qualitative judgment in determining the grades for an assignment or for a course.

ATI Incentive (Extra Credit)

Four ATI Focused RN Medical Surgical Assessment Series Reviews (otherwise known as Targeted Med-Surg 2010) will be available for students- Endocrine, Gastrointestinal, Respiratory and Fluid, Electrolyte, and Acid-Base Imbalances. Each Focused Review consists of 30 items. Students are encouraged to practice taking the reviews as many times as necessary to achieve a score of 90% or greater. Each review should only be taken <u>once in a 24 hour period</u>. Students completing all four (4) reviews with a score of 90% or greater, will receive five (5) points added to their **Exam #3** grade. Focused Reviews must **be completed and submitted by Monday, April 18, 2011.** Hardcopy evidence of successful completion of the four (4) reviews must be submitted to the course faculty by the deadline in order to receive credit for the reviews. Please note, the four (4) reviews must be submitted together. Partial credit will **not** be awarded; students that fail to submit four (4) reviews will **not** earn any credit.
