Successful completion of this course should produce the following outcomes.

- 1. understanding of the basic scientific research process
- 2. competence in identifying components of a study and recognizing their relationships to one another
- 3. appreciation for the influences that previously conducted research and established theories have upon new research
- 4. familiarity with methods of sociological research and related issues, such as validity, reliability, and research ethics
- 5. skills to comprehend and assess research reports as well as to write summaries of new research

Throughout the term, students work on research projects. Three written summaries, due at designated times throughout the semester, should demonstrate the methodological processes involved in formulating and investigating a hypothesis. Specific information about the project appears in the "Semester Project Guidelines."

Four non-cumulative quizzes are given in this course. They include objective and subjective questions that cover the basic concepts discussed in class and in assigned readings.

Five laboratory practicals require students to apply information from class and readings to various research scenarios. Specific information about each lab will be

presented as it becomes relevant. Students have access to their books and notes and may discuss the labs with classmates during lab sessions. These sessions take place during the last ½ hour of class on scheduled dates (see course schedule). Lab responses are due at the end of these classes.

Although attendance, itself, does not affect students' grades in this course, each student receives a class participation grade. IT IS NECSSARY TO ATTEND CLASS TO RECEIVE CLASS PARTICIPATION CREDIT. Contributions to class discussions and activities increase students' participation grades. Obvious inactivity (including sleeping), disruptions (including consistently arriving to class late), and lack of effort lowers the grade.
