Welcome to Spanish 105! Bienvenidos This course is the second in a three-semesterlanguage sequence designed to help you achieve intermediate-level proficiency in Spanish. The class will be conducted in Spanish. The three-semester sequence is designed to help students achieve at least "Intermediate Low" profic iency upon completion. Students will develop skills in reading, writing, conversation, and comprehension, as well as broadening their cultural understanding of the Spanish-speaking world.

You should expect to dedicate at least two hours of study outside of class for every hour of class time. Language leaming is a gradual, cumulative process; you will have the greatest success and see the most long-term gain from consistent, daily work. Your conscientious preparation outside of class a long with your regular attendance and active participation in class will make it possible for you to:

- Communic ate in basic, everyday conversations in Spanish spoken at a nomal or nearnormal pace.
- Talk about events in the past and the present.
- Read some basic texts in Spanish.
- Write fa irly simple texts of different sorts.
- Have a greater understanding of Spanish-speaking countries and of Hispanic cultures.


## Textbook and Materials:

- MySpanishLab (online, part of package). The workbook and audio exercises, as well as the video and extra tutorials are through the MySpanishLab website.
- Spanish-English Dictionary (part of bundled textbook package)
- **If you are continuing from Spanish 100, you will not need to register on MSL again with a new code. You can simply enroll in the appropriate section of Spanish 105. You need to do so immediately.


## REQUIREMENTS AND EVALUATION:

## Attendance:

- Just like playing an instrument or practicing a sport, language leaming occurs best through active participation. Being present is the first step.
- You need to come to class and be on time. 0-3 absences will not be penalized, but may affect class performance. If you will miss class for a religiousholiday, please let me know ahead of time so we can make a rangements for missed work.
- Every absence over three (3), for any rea son, will result in a lowering of the final grade by one point for every additional absence. Exc eptions may be granted only in extra ord inary circ umstances such as prolonged illness or fa mily emergency; these situations may require additional documentation and are not automatic ally gua ranteed. Travel plans are not considered extraordinary circumstances. The student would need to make a rrangements to complete missed work.
- Arriving late ( 10 min or more) to class more than three times will equal one absence.
- Please tum off your cell phone before entering class. YOU MAY NOTCHECK MESSAGES DURING CLASS.

Tests and Final exam: There will be five tests during the semester, one per chapter and one final exam which will be comprehensive. While each will focus on the material recently lea med, it will also draw on material covered in previous chapters. Make-up exams would be given only in extremely unusual circ umstances; a rangements must be made in advance.

## Evaluation of spoken Spanish:

You will have the opportunity to demonstrate proficiency in spoken Spanish in group Power Point presentations. The evaluation will be based on fluency, accuracy, appropriate use of vocabulary and grammarstructures, and pronunciation.

Power Point Group projects: Groups will present a group project on the culture of one of the countries studied. Deta ils will be given later in the semester. The project requires collaboration, but the grades will be individual - so each person should participate equally. The presentation will cover one entire class period the day assigned (please, see the Course Calendar).

Homework: Regular homework will be assigned daily. Most of it will be through MySpanishLab. NO LATE WORK WIL BE ACCEPIED. This daily prepa ration is important for solid language-leaming as well as forming the basis for informed class partic ipation.

Online workbook, lab manual, audio, and video: MySpanishLab provides students the opportunity to practice, self-correct, and identify strengths and weaknesses before the exam. You should progressively work on the exerc ises on your own as we cover each chapter of the book. Students may re-do exercises to better understand the material and to receive a higher grade; the last grade will be the one recorded. Spelling and accentscount!

## Class partic ipation:

- Active participation in class is crucial for inc reasing conversational competence in Spanish. Students are expected to a rive prepared to participate in all class activities by having studied the topics to be covered and having completed all assigned homework.
- Active participation involves speaking and collaborating in paired and group activities, in-class writing, short oral presentations, doing on-line preparatory work, and volunteering thoughtful answers in class disc ussions. Everyone's presence and lively participation is very important to our collective success. Simply being present and
taking notes does not constitute active partic ipation. Consult the detailed departmental rubric at the end of this document.
- ***AL speaking should be in Spanish, even when talking with a nother student. Chatting in English may be considered "negative participation" and will result in a very low participation grade. Speaking in Spanish, even when you make mistakes, get frustrated, or have trouble communicating, helps your bra in leam another language. It's like a sport or playing an instrument-practice is key!
- Special events. There are a number of extra opportunities to practice speaking and hearing Spanish, including the regularmesa española, where students of all levels can chat in Spanish in an informal, low-stress environment. Attending these events is strongly encouraged since they will help students practice and develop fluency.

## Department of Foreign Languages, Spanish Section Guidelines

## Active Participation in class will be graded as follows:

A=95 Excellent participation The student answers questions a nd offers informed comments without the need of the professor calling on him/her. The comments and a nswers show that the student prepared, completed and understood the assignment. Questions reflect an initial attempt to understand the material or to go further, not a lack of preparation. Participation is in Spanish. $\mathrm{B}=\mathbf{8 5}$ Good participation The student answers questions a nd offers informed comments whenever the professor calls on him/her. Sometimes, the student partic ipates without being asked. The comments and a nswers show that the student has prepared a nd understood the assignment. The student may still have doubts about some points, but has made an attempt. Partic ipation is at least attempted in Spanish.
C=75 Fair participation The student a nswers questions a nd offers comments only when the professor calls on him/her. The comments and a nswers show that the student has prepared or attempted to complete the assignment, but doesn't seem to understand it. The student may end up a sking most questions in English or may speak English sometimes with other students during group work.
D=65 Poor participation The student a nswers questions a nd offers very brief comments only when the professor calls on him/her. The comments and a nswers show lack of interest, lack of attention, and/ora poor preparation. Student generally asks questions in English and frequently uses English in group work.
F=55 Lack of participation The student does not a nswer questions a nd does not offer any comments in the class or group disc ussion. The lack of comments, questions a nd answers, as well as incorrect answers, show that the student has not completed the a ssignment; if he/she has done it, it has been in a careless or incomplete way. Student may refuse to speak Spa nish or a bsent him/herself frequently from class.
