- come to understand writing as a way of thinking and demonstrate that, in the act of writing, a writer may construct new knowledge.
- come to understand that success in writing lies in attention to the process as much as in the form of the final product and experience the power of collaboration as part of that process.
- increase their ability to read critically and comprehensively and to synthesize ideas from sources with their own ideas.
- recognize how reading and talking about writing contribute to the development of writing abilities.
- gain facility in writing in a variety of genres for a variety of audiences.
- gain experience in using technology for research and writing and demonstrate competence in finding materials through research and in citing them in an academic style.
- become aware of errors in grammar, usage, punctuation and spelling that may impede a reader's



understanding and increase their facility in avoiding or correcting such errors.

• learn to format a paper for an academic reader.

Students enrolled in the course must complete three major and three minor writing assignments.

Major assignments focus upon expecitory writing and involve multiple submissi

-Major assignments focus upon expository writing and involve multiple submissions, including

outlines, rough drafts, final drafts, and critiques of peers' drafts. Details about each major

writing assignment will be distributed in class and posted on the course's Blackboard site

they become relevant.

-For the minor assignments, students work both independently and in groups to explore and

develop their skills in particular non-expository genres writing. Details about each minor writing assignment will be distributed in class and posted on the course's Blackboard site as they become relevant.

At the end of the semester, students must submit a final portfolio. The portfolio should contain versions of the major and minor writing assignments, revised according to corrections and suggestions written on the documents submitted earlier in the semester. The grade given for the portfolio reflects the degree to which students have considered and addressed these issues.

Portions of the course grade also rely upon performance on breakaway assignments and periodic writing mechanics quizzes. The breakaway assignments require students to develop ideas and then to structure these ideas into short, informal essays. Each breakaway session is completed during a single class meeting. Details about each breakaway assignment will be provided at the beginning of each scheduled breakaway writing session. The mechanics quizzes, given during the first 15 minutes of class on the scheduled dates, assess students' understandings of the grammar and writing conventions reviewed in assigned reading assignments optional exercises.

Students also receive a class participation/activities grade. The class activities portion of this grade reflects student's efforts towards in-class exercises. The participation portion of the grade reflects students' interactions in class. Substantive class discussion or contributions to class activities increases this grade. Conversely, disruption (including consistently arriving late to class), a lack of effort, or obvious inactivity (including sleeping) lowers the grade.

To determine students' grades at the end of the semester, the preceding factors will be combined in the following manner.
