Course Description:

This nursing course exams the pharmacological process utilized by nurses including knowledge of medications, administration of medications, and medication calculations in patients throughout the lifespan. Pharmacological issues, over the counter medications, and herbal medication use will be examined. Reactions, compliancy, and other patient responses to pharmacological therapies will be discussed. This course will be built upon prior nursing knowledge and coordinate with current required nursing courses.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Examine the pharmacological process utilized in the safe administration of medications to client.
- 2. Explore pharmacological issues related to client care.
- 3. Analyze ethical and legal principles associated with medication administration.
