Course Description

This course will explore ideologies of warfare and other forms of sanctioned mass violence, as well as ancient hopes and expectation for peace. Ancient Near Eastern texts and practices will be studied in addition to biblical texts.

Course Goals

Biblical texts are often read as reflecting the assumptions of the reader. A closer examination of the biblical texts reveals a wide variety of attitudes about violence, ranging from poetic hopes for peace to disturbing calls for mass slaughter. This course will study biblical attitudes about war and peace against its Near Eastern background, in order to fully appreciate both the range of views as well as the historical realities these texts affirm or challenge.

Assignments and Grading

1) Grading will be based on four essay examinations and two research papers as well (see the Student Handbook for the academic honesty policy). The exams and papers are weighted equally, and the course grade will be based on an average of all of these assignments. Plagiarized papers will receive F grades, and will result in a one-letter grade reduction for your course grade overall at least, and a failing grade in the class at most.
