# CATALOG/COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Clinical practicum in which students establish their role as a professional nurse. Transition to entry-level practitioner by understanding of autonomy, interdependency, leadership, and collaboration.

# COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Engage in continuous inquiry and synthesize knowledge from the humanities, sciences, ethics, and leadership and nursing theory as a basis for determining and prioritizing nursing care for clients with complex health problems.

1. Display skills in leadership, management and collaboration while providing safe, high quality, holistic care to clients and families.

- 2. Develop accountability in the roles of professional nurse leader: practitioner, counselor, educator, advocate and coordinator.
- 3. Participate in the change process to influence health care delivery, basing interventions on latest evidence-based nursing practice.
- 4. Incorporate cultural competence and spiritual sensitivity while leading and managing the nursing care of clients and families.
- 5. Maintain ethical and professional nursing standards in the role of nursing leader and patient advocate.

#### **STUDENT EXPECTATIONS & COURSE POLICIES:**

Students will be responsible to adhere to the *Classroom Guidelines for courtesy* & *respect*. This document will be reviewed, discussed and agreed upon in class and will then be posted on blackboard.

#### Students will also be responsible to adhere to the 4 A's

- 1. *Attendance* Please make every attempt to come to all the class sessions, to come to class on time, and to stay until the end of the meeting unless you have informed me that you must leave early.
  - Class attendance is an expectation. Students are expected to be prepared and attend all class meetings. This includes completing necessary assignments prior to attending class. Students who are not prepared for class may not be able to meet course standards and therefore are at risk for course failure.
  - If unable to attend a class, please contact the instructor via email, pager or phone a minimum of one (1) hour prior to the start of the class session. Absence due to illness requires written verification from a licensed physician or nurse practitioner. Failure to notify the instructor will result in one point for each occurrence off the final course grade based on 100 points. Students are responsible for obtaining any notes, handouts, or other class items from classmates. Students are encouraged to also review the Attendance Policy in Nursing Student Handbook.
  - Tardiness is a distraction to the class/clinical and will not be tolerated. Faculty members will use their discretion to deduct points from the final course grade for any lateness. Four incidences of lateness will equate to 1 absence, deductions will be made according to the attendance statement above.
  - Clinical attendance is mandatory. Students are expected to be prepared and attend clinical as scheduled. Students who are not prepared for clinical may not be able to meet course standards and therefore are at risk for course failure.
  - If unable to attend clinical, the student is responsible to contact the clinical instructor two hours prior to the scheduled clinical experience by <u>phone</u>. If a student is absent from clinical due to an illness, a health care provider's statement verifying the illness and certifying that the student is able to resume clinical activity may be required. Alternative assignments may be required at the discretion of the course faculty in addition to clinical makeup. Students are required to makeup clinical absences. Due to the nature of this clinical course, the designated clinical makeup day will occur independently prior to the last day of class (April 30, 2012). Student's participation in clinical constitutes a substantial part of course success, in which case

excessive student absence will lower her/his final course grade and is at the discretion of the course instructors.

- 2. Active learning- Each student is to own their learning by engaging in the learning process. Active participation is measured by demonstrating responsibility and ownership in the learning process. Some examples of participation are as follows: completing required readings, assignments, discussion, and/or providing feedback by the due date. The student can expect to work approximately 8-12 hours per week outside of class time in preparing for this class. Additionally, holding others accountable for preparation as student and instructor will deepen our exploration of knowledge and its applicability throughout the semester.
- 3. Academic Integrity- Students are responsible to maintain scholarship by being professional and honest in producing their own academic work. In accordance with the Student Handbook statement on Academic Honesty (http://www.moravian.edu/studentLife/handbook/academic/academic2.html) the following include acts of academic dishonesty and participation in such will result in possible course/assignment failure:
  - **Plagiarism** is the intentional use of another's words or ideas as your own. This can range from using another individual's direct words or changing the words slightly (paraphrasing) without the appropriate citation to purchasing a paper from the Internet or a professional writing service. Refer to the Moravian College Academic Honesty Policy in the Student Handbook. APA format is required for all written assignments unless specified otherwise.
  - **Cheating** comes in many forms but essentially results in work being submitted with unauthorized use of resources or peer help.
  - **Falsification** is when the student provides a false excuse for an absence from an examination, test, quiz or other course requirement, directly or through another source
  - Other **unprofessional behaviors** such as tampering, damaging or hindering the work of others to complete their own assignments will not be tolerated.

Clinical requirements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 2. Clinical policies and expectations are described in the "Guidelines for Nursing 317 Clinical" resource packet available on Blackboard. Students are expected to print this packet and read the information prior to the start of the precepted clinical experience.
- 3. Attendance and participation at clinical conferences is mandatory. The dates for the three scheduled conferences are noted on the course calendar.
- 4. Written clinical requirements include:
  - Clinical log maintenance of patient experiences
  - Pre- and Post- Clinical Goals summaries
  - Clinical Weekly goals and progress notes
  - Clinical Skills Checklist
  - Anedotal evaluation of clinical performance and preceptor experience
  - Self-evaluation of clinical performance using the clinical evaluation tool in the clinical packet and the formative/summative evaluation forms
  - Preceptor(s) evaluation of clinical performance using the clinical evaluation tool in the clinical packet
- 5. The student cannot engage in the clinical practicum experience until she/he has earned an acceptable score on the ATI RN Comprehensive exam (i.e. consonant with predicting to pass the NCLEX-RN within a 90% confidence interval).
