Upon completing this course, students should be able to

- 1. distinguish between aspects of sex and gender and characterize various relationships between the two.
- 2. consider gender as a social construction, recognizing the forces involved in gender socialization.
- 3. compare and contrast male and female lives, lifestyles, and gender roles across the world.
- 4. apply relevant sociological theories to issues of gender relations.
- 5. understand the bases for, manifestations of, and results of sex and gender inequality in various social institutions.

Course grades reflect five factors.

quizzes - Three non-cumulative quizzes assess student understanding of the basic concepts discussed in assigned readings and in class. Each quiz consists of three short-answer questions.



exploration papers - Two exploration papers require students to use their awareness of gender issues to analyze various social contexts. Instructions for these papers appear in the "Exploration Paper Guidelines."

research paper - A research paper serves as the course's "final experience." Instructions for this paper appears in the "Research Paper Guidelines."

peer reviews – Students review classmates' drafts of both of the exploration papers and the research paper. On each day when a draft is due, each students will receive a copy of the paper to review during class that day.


class participation/activities – Although attendance, itself, does not directly affect students' grades in this course, each student receives a class participation grade. IT IS NECSSARY TO ATTEND CLASS TO RECEIVE CLASS PARTICIPATION CREDIT AND STUDENTS MAY NOT MAKE UP CLASS ACTIVITIES THAT THEY MISS. Contributions to class discussions and in-class exercises increase s. Obvious inactivity (including sleeping), disruptions (such as consistently arriving late to class), or obvious lack of effort lowers the grade.

The preceding factors will be combined in the following manner to determine students' course grades.

QUIZZES 45% (15% each) EXPLORATION PAPERS 20% (10% each)

RESEARCH PAPER 20%
PEER REVIEWS 5%
CLASS ACTIVITIES/PARTICIPATION 10%
