Objectives: The aim of the Spanish 100-105-110 program is to establish the basis of a life-long learning experience in the Spanish language, which will include the development of communicative skills and learning about the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. The material of study is divided into three semesters and throughout the program, students develop language skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in Spanish which allow them to handle simple real life situations and simple communicative tasks. They should be able to ask and answer questions in simple sentences about themselves, their daily routine, and so forth, within meaningful, culturally authentic contexts. Students are expected to attain the "Intermediate Low" level of proficiency upon completion of this basic language program.

Español 105 will focus on Lessons 6-10 of *¡Arriba! Comunicación y cultura*. **What is your goal as you prepare for this class?** It should *NOT* be just "to get the homework done". It should be

to *master the material*, whether learning vocabulary, learning verb forms, or understanding concepts. The assignments in your book and in *myspanishlab.com* are tools to that end. The assignments are *NOT* the end. Use the tools you are assigned and whatever others you find appropriate and useful. If you approach your work in this spirit, you will learn more.

IMPORTANT NOTE: This will be a demanding course. Expect to spend about 2-3 hours outside class for every session. The good news is that you have excellent resources and by doing the work conscientiously, you will be speaking Spanish competently at an elementary level in no time. You will be using **myspanishlab Online Resources**. This is a nationally hosted online learning system created for students in college-level language courses. It includes a wide array of language-learning tools and resources: interactive version of the ¡Arriba! Student Activities Manual, an electronic version of the ¡Arriba! textbook, and all materials from the ¡Arriba! Audio and video programs, Readiness checks, chapter tests/practices, tutorials, vocabulary flashcards, grammar lessons, cultural lessons in video, a glossary, and much more. You can even record and listen to yourself. Much of your homework will be done online at www.myspanishlab.com. You will not have time to use everything that is there but we hope you will at least become familiar with what is available so you can use what will most help you. **Instructors** can use this system to make assignments, post announcements, set grading parameters, listen to student-created audio recordings, e-mail students, collect and keep scores of graded exercises, assignments and tests, and provide feedback on student work. **Students** will need to use a Student Access Code to access **myspanishlab (MSL)** – Attention! New students will receive instructions on how to register in **myspanishlab course**. All students must enroll in my course Spanish 105A, **Course ID CRSKL8M-9568**, in order to access assignments, announcements, notes, instructions, and other online resources. Your progress report will be available on **Blackboard**. Please register on Blackboard and enroll in my class: **Introductory Spanish II**.

Before coming to class, you are to prepare all assigned materials. Writing should be done neatly and kept in a loose-leaf notebook.

FORMAT FOR WRITTEN WORK

*I will **not** accept work that does not follow these formats*

Handwritten:

- Use smooth-edged paper (no spiral notebook tear-outs)
- Write NEATLY on every other line.
- Write QUESTIONS and answers. Answer in complete sentences unless otherwise directed.
- Clearly label each activity.
- This applies to written activities from MSL and from the textbook.

Typed:

- Use **12 pt** Times New Roman or Arial.

- Use double space.
- Write QUESTIONS and answers. Answer in complete sentences unless otherwise directed.
- Clearly label each activity.
- This applies to written activities from MSL and from the textbook.

Graded written work. Generally we will go over written assignments in class. I will sometimes collect it for a grade. At the end of each chapter there will be a more extensive writing activity that will be done during class.

Class attendance: Faithful attendance is expected, since continuous practice is needed in order to learn a language. The learning of a language is a cumulative process, and it is not easy to make up for several missed classes.

- An unexcused absence will result in a class grade of 0 (zero) for that day as well as a grade of 0 (zero) in any quiz, test or homework assignment due that day. I will excuse absences due to illness or other emergency, but **ONLY IF YOU NOTIFY ME BEFORE THE CLASS TO BE MISSED**. If you can't call or e-mail, have someone do it for you. In addition, you must present a documented excuse when you come back to class! If your absence is excused and you wish to be considered for a make-up, you must contact me *before the next class meeting*.
- In case of extended absences the student should talk to Student Services or the Academic Dean who will contact the professor. **Only if the Dean justifies the absences, they will be excused (and points will not be taken off)**.
- Your weekly class participation grade will suffer beginning with the first absence, regardless of the reason for it.
- **Remember:** Requests to excuse absences at the end of the semester will not be considered. Students have the responsibility of keeping track of their own absences. No reminders will be given.
- This is NOT an online course. You must attend class to succeed.

Class participation: Students are expected to come to class having prepared ALL materials assigned by the professor. In class, students **must participate actively** speaking in group activities, pair work, short oral presentations, and class discussions. Missing class lowers the participation grade.

Active Participation in class will be graded as follows:

A= 95 or higher *Excellent participation* (the student answers questions and offers interesting comment without the need of the professor or the debate leader calling on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student prepared, completed and understood the assignment.

B = 85 *Good participation* (the student answers questions and offers interesting comments whenever the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. Sometimes, the student participates without being asked. The comments and answers show that the student has prepared and understood the assignment.

C= 75 *Fair participation* (the student answers questions and offers comments only when the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student has prepared or attempted to complete the assignment, but doesn't seem to understand it.

D= 65 *Poor participation* (the student answers questions and offers very brief comments only when the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. The comments and answers show lack of interest and/or a poor preparation.

F= 55 *Lack of participation* (the student does not answer questions and does not offer any comments in the class or group discussion. The lack of comments and answers as well as incorrect answers, show that the student has not completed the assignment or, if he/she has done it, it has been in a careless or incomplete way).

Tests/Pruebas: There will be a test after every chapter and a final oral exam. All **chapter tests**, except for chapter 10, will be written and they will include the following: vocabulary, contextualized grammar, listening, reading and comprehension, short compositions, and cultural topics. The last chapter test will be oral and will be graded as follows: listening/comprehension, content/information conveyed, vocabulary, use of grammar, pronunciation and fluency at the second semester Spanish college level- 105. **The final oral exam** will be comprehensive (lessons 6-10) and will be given during the last four sessions of the semester.

Things to remember about your **final oral exam**:

1. Students must have a partner (from class) and both students must select one of the dates indicated on the course calendar.
2. Oral exam will cover materials from lessons 6-10. Basically, you and your partner will have to be prepared to talk about/discuss topics related to these lessons (format: dialogues, interviews, plays, etc.)
3. Instructor will provide a list of these topics for you and your partner to prepare outside of class.
4. Instructor will select 3-4 topics at random from the list, the date of your oral exam.
5. Instructor will provide specific guidelines and grading criteria at least two weeks before the final.
6. Exam will take about 8-10 minutes (per pair).

The **midterm** will be a group project (Power Point Presentations). All students must give a group oral presentation in class. Topics must be related to issues in the Hispanic world. Students will have to work in groups of 4-5 students. Together they will select a topic and notify their instructor at least a week before presenting in class. All members of a group must participate in the research part of the project and be ready to present it in class the date assigned (NOTE: one evaluation per group and one grade for all the members of the group). Duration of presentation 10-15 minutes, including a session of questions and answers.

To prepare, students **must** do the following:

- Work in groups of 4-5 students
- Select a topic and present it in class
- Seek advice from instructor when selecting their topic (guidelines and grading criteria will be provided by instructor)
- Turn in an outline of the presentation and a list of sources used.

REMEMBER! Unauthorized absences from the tests, the midterm or the final exam will result in a grade of zero for that test or exam. Make-ups will only be given if students inform the professor of the reason for the absence **before** the exam is given in class by calling (or having someone call) or sending an E-mail message. The make-up will be given at the professor's discretion.

Homework: You **must** go to www.myspanishlab.com to access your homework assignment (check online calendar and announcements regularly). Your assignments can be completed online and scores will be collected by your instructor. Some online activities will be computer-graded and others will be instructor-graded. **Please pay attention to deadlines.**

Quizzes (*Pruebas de vocabulario*): There will be several unannounced vocabulary quizzes during the semester. No make-up quizzes will be given for unexcused absences. SEE ATTENDANCE POLICY REGARDING EXCUSED ABSENCES.

IMPORTANT: AS A GENERAL RULE FOR THIS CLASS, NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED AND MAKE-UP EXAMS WILL BE GIVEN IN EXTREMELY UNUSUAL CIRCUMSTANCES.

Homework **may** be graded and so must be done **independently. It is your responsibility to avoid dishonest behavior!**
