## **Course Objectives:**

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the language, theory, history and ideologies of Management and Organizational Theory. To that end:

\* We will explore the meaning of management and how managers perform in a variety of private, nonprofit and public organizations; Further, we will do so by reviewing both Anglo-American and Global approaches.

\* We will be introduced to the foundation of the modern organizational theory by exploring the history of management thought and the great ideas of

organizational thinkers.

\* We will look at the major topical areas of the law; including not limited to a review of Comparative systems; ethics; diversity; planning; staffing; human resources; motivation; organizational design and structure; leadership theory; evaluation and other control and auditing standards.

## Requirements and Methods of Evaluation:

There are four requirements to successfully complete this class:

- \* You will be expected to attend and participate regularly in class (See Attendance and Participation Policy below)
- \* You will be expected to read the homework assigned to you, whether in the book or by handout.
- \* You will be expected to participate in at least one team "Case Project" for which you are asked to present.
- \* You will be expected to take all three (3) exams at the times at which they are scheduled.
