# CATALOG/COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Clinical practicum in which students establish their role as a professional nurse. Transition to entry-level practitioner by understanding of autonomy, interdependency, leadership, and collaboration.

#### **CLINICAL REQUIREMENTS:**

Clinical requirements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Clinical attendance is mandatory. Students are expected to be prepared and attend clinical as scheduled. Students who are not prepared for clinical may not be able to meet course standards and therefore are at risk for course failure.
- If unable to attend clinical, the student is responsible to contact the clinical instructor two hours prior to the scheduled clinical experience by <a href="phone">phone</a>. If a student is absent from clinical due to an illness, a health care provider's statement verifying the illness and certifying that the student is able to resume clinical activity may be required. Due to the nature of this clinical course, clinical hours must be completed by the last day of class (April 27, 2013). \*\*\*\*The student cannot engage in the clinical practicum experience until she/he has earned an acceptable score on the ATI RN Comprehensive exam (i.e. consonant with predicting to pass the NCLEX-RN within a 90% confidence interval).
