



Nursing Elective - NURS 322 Nursing of Populations at High Risk for Health Problems/Honduras

Course Description:

This nursing elective course seeks to facilitate the senior/junior level student's understanding of a specific population of people at high risk for health problems. The population may be found in any location. International placement for this course experience is encouraged.

Program Philosophy:

Course Objectives:

- 1. Describe the burden of disease, health needs and disparities of disadvantaged people in developing countries.
- 2. Identify global health issues specific to a high-risk population.
- 3. Contribute to this learning community through identification of an area of focus of global health for individual investigation and dissemination.
- 4. Apply culture specific values in providing nursing care/global healthcare appropriate to the mission sites.
- 5. Performs role of professional nurse/global healthcare worker in practice as defined by the course setting.

Course Units: 1 Theory Hours: 2 Clinical Hours: 1 week in Honduras
