# Ancient Near Eastern Religion

**Course Description:** A study of the religions of the ancient Near East, this course will explore the myths and rituals of the peoples of Mesopotamia, Syria-Palestine, and Egypt before the Roman era. Foundational to western civilization in general, these religions also form the cultural context and background for the sacred scriptures of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

**Course Goals:** This course will not just focus on mythology, but also on ancient religion as lived experience. While the differences between these religions and those of today are substantial and will be explored in detail, this course will reveal the commonalities of religious life then and now. Ancient religions were expressions of the hopes, fears, anxieties, and imaginations that are basic to the human experience, and the study of these religions opens a window to the understanding of people of the past as human beings, and a better perspective on modern religious life as well.

Assignments and Grading: There will be four exams, each worth 10% of your grade, and four take-home essay questions based on the assigned books, each worth 5%. There will be two research papers as well, each counting for 20%. Plagiarism can result in a failed paper or failing grade in the class as a whole (see the Student Handbook for the academic honesty policy). Attendance roll will be taken in each class day, with two unexcused absences reducing the total course grade by 1/3 of a letter. Assigned readings should be done before the class for which they are assigned. This is not a passive-learning course; we will be actively studying and discussing the texts and other material in class.
