Goals

- To develop instructional skills on percussion instruments through the learning of basic performance skills.
- To develop a concept of good percussion tone quality.
- To compile a bibliography of instructional and reference material.
- To learn maintenance procedures.

Required Activities

- Attendance in class and participation in lectures, discussions & class practice of percussion techniques.
- For best results, 30 minutes of daily practice is recommended. Snare drum skills may be practiced in any location. Students may use Foy 113 or the Foy stage for keyboard percussion and timpani practice.
- Read and prepare the material on the list shown on the accompanying OUTLINE & ASSIGNMENTS table.

Assessment

- There will be three playing exams. The average score of the playing tests will form 50% of the final grade. There will also be two written exams. The average score of the written tests will form 50% of the final grade.
- Examination Dates
 - 1st playing exam: September 16, 2013 in class
 - 2nd playing examination: *October 9*, 2013 by appointment
 - 1st written examination: *October 9, 2013 in class*
 - 2nd written examination: *December 4, 2013 in class*
 - 3rd playing examination: *December 9, 2013 by appointment*
- Examination Content
 - Material is derived from class lectures and reading assignments.
 - Written exams contain multiple choice, short answer and essay questions.
 - Playing exam grades will be calculated from the correct number of beats performed and from correct
 execution of scales and correct tuning of timpani. Repertoire will be given at least one class in advance.

Attendance & other course policies

- Students are permitted one unexcused absence without penalty. Beyond that, the final semester grade will be reduced by one degree (i.e. B+ to B, etc.) beginning with the second unexcused absence or accumulated lateness. Students are responsible for providing bona fide documentation to the instructor if there is a valid reason for an absence.
- Punctual attendance is expected at all class sessions. Attendance is taken at the beginning of class. Students who are not present at that time will be marked as being absent. Students who arrive late are responsible for seeing the instructor after class to make sure that they are included in the roll. If there is a legitimate reason for the lateness, you must speak to the instructor immediately after that class session.
