# Introduction to the Literature of Spain \& Latin America through Short Fiction \& Film (M2) 

We will study key verbal and visual narratives that have shaped the Hispanic tradition, focusing primarily on the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Through our study of Hispanic literature and film, we will address questions of power, ethics, relationships, and artistic representation. Special attention will be given to critical thinking and interpretation, speaking and writing skills. This course is conducted entirely in Spanish. Pre-requisites: Span 210 \& 215. May be taken concurrently with Span 210 with instructor permission.

## In class

Our classroom community is strengthened through respect, dialogue and active engagement with the material and with each other. We will commit to turning off phones \& other devices and concentrate on conversing in Spanish.

Every absence over two, regardless of reason, will lower the final grade by one point. It's like having two "personal leave/sick days" at work; use them wisely. Exceptions will be made in extraordinary circumstances and require additional documentation.

Each student will have the opportunity to open our discussion of one of the texts or films. This presentation helps students develop their formal speaking skills useful for both academic and professional settings.

## Outside of class

As you know, much of your success in class depends on your consistent efforts and work outside of class. You should expect to spend at least 6 $\mathrm{hrs} / \mathrm{wk}$ on homework and other assignments.

Homework: regular, informal writing opportunities to check comprehension, expand vocabulary, reinforce grammar, strengthen writing, and develop ideas. You will earn a B by completing all the required exercises. If you meet the criteria for a B and demonstrate consistently superior quality in your work, you will earn an A. Missing or incomplete work earns a grade from C to F .

Short essays: short formal essays (1-2 pages) facilitate the development of critical thinking and writing skills. Specific instructions will be posted on Blackboard. Please type and double-space all papers and include all previous drafts, including comments from any reader or tutor. Papers are due, printed out, at the start of class; late papers lose 10 points/day. Exceptions are made in rare circumstances.

The final paper ( 5 pages) will be a research paper in miniature, allowing students the chance to practice the research skills needed at advanced levels, as well as the opportunity to focus on a topic of his or her choice. It will include an exploratory essay ( $\mathbf{w}$ / elements of an annotated bibliography). Details will be posted on Blackboard.
