CLINICAL REQUIREMENTS:

Clinical requirements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- **Clinical attendance is mandatory.** Students are expected to be prepared and attend clinical as scheduled. Students who are not prepared for clinical may not be able to meet course standards and therefore are at risk for course failure.
- If unable to attend clinical, the student is responsible to contact the clinical instructor AND the unit charge nurse two hours prior to the scheduled clinical experience by *phone*. If a student is absent from clinical due to an illness, a health care provider's statement verifying the illness and certifying that the student is able to resume clinical activity may be required. Alternative assignments may be required at the discretion of the course faculty in addition to clinical makeup. <u>Students are required to makeup clinical absences</u>. Due to the nature of this clinical course, clinical hours must be completed by the last day of class (April 26, 2013). Student's participation in clinical constitutes a substantial part of course success, in which case excessive student absence will lower her/his final course grade and is at the discretion of the course instructors.
