# **Rel: 290ST: Development of Christianity**

### **Course Description:**

This course will explore the institutions, social forces, ideas and personalities that shaped the development of the Christian Church from its beginnings to the eve of the Reformation. Special emphasis will be placed on how these entities not only shape the trajectory of the Church but continue to impact the current beliefs and practices of today's Church.

### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. To examine from diverse historical perspectives and analyses the institutions, social forces, ideas and personalities that were part of the Christian Church from the death of Jesus to the Reformation.
- 2. To examine how these events relate to the larger flow of Western History.
- 3. To understand the historical discussion of the relation between revelation and reason that developed during this period.
- 4. To explore how the development of the Church then translates to today and how it is manifested in current Church doctrine and practice. Special emphasis will be placed on the discussion between revelation and reason, and its relation to the current debate between science and religion.
- 5. To be able to express your understanding of this material coherently, cogently and clearly in both written and oral form.

### **Course Evaluation:**

<u>Reflection Papers</u> (40%): you will be asked to write four (4) 4-5 page papers based on the material being studied. The papers will be evaluated on your understanding and use of the course material as well as the quality of your argumentation and writing. They will be due on the dates indicated in the syllabus.

<u>Class Presentation</u> (20%): This will be a 5-10 minute presentation on an important figure in the development of the Early and Medieval Church. The focus should be on the individual's life and contributions. A list of possible subjects will be provided during Week 1. Its due date will be keyed to his/her time period in Church History. It will be evaluated on the quality of your research and the quality of the presentation. Further rubrics as well as scheduled meetings will be provided.

<u>Final Research Paper</u> (20%) This will be 8-10 page paper with proper annotations and bibliography in which you will reflect on the impact of a particular doctrine or event on the current practices or beliefs of the contemporary Christian Church. It will be evaluated on the quality of your research, the effectiveness of use and the quality of argumentation and presentation. There will be benchmark meetings with this paper. The paper is due on the date indicated in the syllabus.

<u>Class Participation</u> (20%): This refers to active participation in the class over and above the Class Presentation. Active participation means the voluntary participation in class discussions as well as the asking of pertinent questions. This participation will also involve the guided reading of the primary sources. Guiding questions will be provided for each reading.
