Welcome to Spanish 105! This course is the sec ond in a three-semesterlanguage sequence designed to help you achieve basic proficiency in Spanish. The class will be conducted entirely in Spanish. The three-semester sequence is designed to help students ac hieve at least "Intemediate Low" profic iency upon completion. Students will develop skills in reading, writing, conversation, and comprehension, as well as broadening their cultural understanding of the Spanish-speaking world.

You should expect to dedicate at least two hours of study outside of class for every hour of class time. Language leaming is a gradual, cumulative process; you will have the greatest success and see the most long-term gain from consistent, daily work. Your conscientious preparation outside of class a long with your regular attendance and active partic ipation in class will make it possible for you to:

- Communic ate in basic, everyday conversations in Spanish spoken at a nomal or nearnormal pace.
- Talk about events in the past and the present.
- Read basic texts in Spanish.
- Write fa irly simple texts of different sorts.
- Have a greater understanding of Spanish-speaking countries and of Hispanic cultures.

- **|f you are continuing from Spanish 100, you will not need to register on MSL a gain with a new code. You can simply enroll in the appropriate section of Spanish 105. You need to do so immediately.


## REQUIREMENTS AND EVALUATION:

## Attendance:

- Just like playing an instrument or practicing a sport, language leaming occurs best through active partic ipation. Being present is the first step.
- You need to come to class and be on time. 0-3 absences will not be penalized, but may affect class performance. If you will miss class for a religiousholiday, please let me know ahead of time so we can make a rangements for missed work.
- Every absence over three (3), for any rea son, will result in a lowering of the final grade by one point for every additional absence. Exceptions may be granted only in extra ord inary circ umstances such as prolonged illness or fa mily emergency; these situations may require additional documentation and are not automatic ally gua ranteed. Travel plans are not considered extraordinary circumstances. The student would need to make a rrangements to complete missed work.
- Ariving late ( 10 min or more) to class more than three times will equal one absence.
- Please tum off your cell phone and place it in your bag before entering class.

Tests and Final exam: There will be four tests during the semester and one final exam. Each exam iscumulative; while each will focus on the material recently leamed, it will also draw on material covered in previous chapters. Make-up exams would be given only in extremely unusual circ umstances; a rrangements must be made in advance.

## Evaluation of spoken Spanish:

You will have the opportunity to demonstrate proficiency in spoken Spanish in individual presentations at the end of the semester. The evaluation will be based on fluency, accuracy, appropriate use of voc abulary and grammar structures, and pronunciation.

Quizes: There will be approximately one quiz per week. They will be brief and are designed to help both the student and the professor keep track of progress; they also reinforce the leaming process. No make up quizes will be given. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

## Compositions:

- You will write three compositions and complete revisions based on feedback. Compositions should be typed and double-spaced. Compositions are due at the beginning of class a nd may not be emailed to me unless we have made previous arrangements (e.g. in the case of absence because of religiousholiday). Compositions will be evaluated based on vocabulary, syntax, grammar, fulfilling requirements for each assignment, and creativity. Details will be posted ahead of time.
- Late work will lose 10 points per day, a nd I will not accept it after 3 days.

Group projects: Each week, one group will present a group project on the current events and culture of one of the countries studied. Details will be posted. You must disc uss the presentation with the professor at least a week in advance. The project requirescollaboration, but the grades will be individual - so each person should participate equally.

Homework: Regular homework will be assigned daily. Most of it will be through MySpanishLab. Other assignments should be hand-written and are due at the beginning of class. Please write on a separate sheet of paper, not in the textbook. NO LATE WORK WIL BE ACCEPIED. Seriously. This da aily preparation is important for solid language-leaming as well asforming the basis for informed class participation.

Online workbook, lab manual, audio, and video: MySpa nishLab provides students the opportunity to practice, self-correct, and identify strengths and weaknesses before the exam. You should progressively work on the exerc ises on your own as they are assigned. Students are
expected to complete all assigned exercises. Students may re-do exerc ises to better understand the material and to receive a highergrade; the last grade will be the one recorded. Spelling and accents count! I record the gradesthe day of the exam.

## Class partic ipation:

- Active participation in class is c rucial for inc reasing conversational competence in Spanish. Students are expected to a mive prepared to participate in all class activities by having studied the topics to be covered and having completed all assigned homework.
- Active participation involves speaking and collaborating in paired and group activities, in-class writing, short oral presentations, doing on-line preparatory work, and volunteering thoughtful answers in class disc ussions. Everyone's presence and lively participation is crucial to our collective success. Simply being present and taking notes does not constitute active participation. Consult the detailed departmental rubric at the end of this document.
- ***AL speaking should be in Spanish, even when talking with a nother student. Chatting in English may be considered "negative participation" and will result in a very low participation grade. Speaking in Spanish, even when you make mistakes, get frustrated, or have trouble communicating, helpsyour brain leam how to leam Spanish. It's like a sport or playing an instrument-practice is key!
- Special events. There are a number of extra opportunities to practice speaking and hearing Spanish, including the regularmesa española, where students of all levels can chat in Spanish in an informal, low-stress environment.

## Department of Foreign Languages, Spanish Section Guidelines Active Partic ipation in class will be graded as follows:

A=95 Excellent participation The student answers questions and offers informed comments without the need of the professor calling on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student prepared, completed and understood the assignment. Questions reflect an initial attempt to understand the material or to go further, not a lack of preparation. Participation is in Spanish. B=85 Good participation The student answers questions and offers informed comments whenever the professor calls on him/her. Sometimes, the student partic ip ates without being asked. The comments and answers show that the student has prepared and understood the assignment. The student may still have doubts about some points, but has made an attempt. Partic ipation is at least attempted in Spanish.
C=75 Fair participation The student answers questions and offers comments only when the professor callson him/her. The comments and answers show that the student hasprepared or attempted to complete the assignment, but doesn't seem to understand it. The student may end up asking most questions in English or may speak Eng lish sometimes with other students during group work.
D=65 Poor participation The student answers questions a nd offers very brief comments only when the professor calls on him/her. The comments a nd answers show lack of interest, lack of attention, and/or a poor preparation. Student generally asks questions in English and frequently uses English in group work.
F=55 Lack of participation The student does not answer questions a nd does not offer any comments in the class or group disc ussion. The lack of comments, questions and answers, as well as inc orrect answers, show that the student has not completed the assignment; if he/she has done it, it has been in a careless or incomplete way. Student may refuse to speak Spanish or absent him/herself frequently from class.
