The law is a profession dependent on precedent, on what has zone before and the established reasons why. Yet most lawyers would say it's also a creative profession, with room for new and novel arguments and for solutions that haven't been tried before.

OVERVIEW: Many contemporary scholars identify several principle areas as fundamental to the field of family law. First, family law addresses issues centered on the formation and dissolution of various family relationships, namely, marriage, divorce and, more recently, procreation and alternative families. Second, family law examines the law that governs the rights, obligations and responsibilities that flow from family relationships, including but not limited to relationships between parent and child, spouses, and other third parties, as well as medical decision-making, neglect and abuse.

<u>GOALS</u>: Students will have an opportunity to learn how family law is formed, interpreted and practiced, and how law emerges from the social fibers of our society, attempting to evolve as social standards, customs and technology evolves. Students will also learn how family law is impacted by both the U.S. Constitution and the Constitutions of the many States. Students are expected to read and understand the assignments, using analytical skills of legal reasoning. While some legal education will be helpful, it is not absolutely necessary.

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Please note that attendance in class is vital if you expect to do well. Students who do not attend class regularly receive lower grades. This is an upper-level four credit course and a lot of ground is covered in each class, since we only meet once a week. There may be times when an emergency (illness, family problem) may prevent attendance. In this case, you have the responsibility to contact me if you want to make up missed assignments.

Please note that since this is an evening class, daytime college events may not result in class being cancelled. I will do my best to notify everyone via email in the event class is cancelled for any reason but do not assume that if day classes are cancelled, evening classes are cancelled as well. You should read your email regularly and also consult the college website, especially for weather-related cancellations.

ACADEMIC HONESTY: Students are expected to consult and follow the policies of the college as set forth in the current edition of the <u>Student Handbook</u>. Any student found violating these policies will be dismissed from the course and given a failing grade. Honesty is expected in all respects.

CLASS PARTICIPATION: This is not strictly a lecture course. It is very important for students to come to class prepared to discuss the assigned reading material. Even though this class meets only once per week, the four course credits given dictate the amount of material to be

covered. Remember the college rule of thumb – preparation time for the class should be at least double the amount of class time. BRING YOUR TEXTBOOKS AND ALL HANDOUTS TO CLASS. Remember – class participation is 10% of your final grade so lack of attendance will result in a poor class participation grade.

I expect all students to contribute to class discussions, to respond to questions I pose and to ask questions. I view all questions and comments as a positive learning experience for both you and I.

ENJOY! Remember that knowledge increases with challenge. You will gain knowledge when you come to class prepared and utilize your life experiences in conjunction with what you learn. Thus, this class will hopefully be both challenging and enjoyable for you! I do my best not to have a boring class!

- 3. <u>Course Project/Term Paper:</u> The instructions, a set of facts and "party" assignments will be distributed by the third class and the project is to be completed and turned in by the last class on December 3rd. The fact pattern contained in the project will also be used throughout the course for discussion and resolution of potential issues, argument of positions on the issues and application of the law. The fact pattern is susceptible to change as additional information develops throughout the course and if the positions of the parties change (and possibly because parties don't always tell the whole story or disclose pertinent facts).
