You will be expected to observe departmental guidelines for attendance at recitals and concerts.

Attendance policy

Your attendance is expected at all class meetings. You will be allowed one unexcused absence without penalty. After that, your final grade will be lowered by a fraction of a grade for each unexcused absence. Assignments are due by 4:00 PM on the due date. Late papers handed in within 24 hours of the due date will be docked one fraction of a grade (A- becomes B+). Late papers handed in after 24 hours but within a week of the due date are docked one full grade. Papers handed in after that will receive a zero. Extensions are granted only in emergency situations and must be requested in advance. All assignments that receive an A- or lower may be redone as often as is necessary for a \checkmark +. Four \checkmark + grades are required to bump your final grade up a fraction (B+ to an A-). If you receive six \checkmark + grades, your final grade will be bumped up a full letter grade. You have an unlimited number of opportunities to redo your assignments. The last time and day to hand in redos is 4:00 PM on the final day of classes. [submit original paper along with the redo]

The goals of Form

After completing a half-course in Form, a student will be able to:

- 1. identify and recognize standard elements of form in Western music, including repetition, contrast, and variation
- 2. recognize standard forms in Western music through score analysis; including binary, rounded binary, ternary (ABA), theme and variations, sonata form, canon, rounds, inventions, and fugues.
- 3. identify the main themes, tonal plan, and formal subdivisions for each of the forms listed in #2 above (as relevant), using pieces currently in preparation for performance, or which they will be hearing in the current semester.
- 4. compose original examples of binary and ternary forms, theme and variations, and rounds using simple textures and diatonic harmonies.
- 5. identify the use of fundamental concepts of tonal counterpoint in given musical examples (concepts include tonal and real answers, inversion, augmentation, diminution and sequence).
- 6. compose an original line of 2:1 tonal counterpoint against a given melody
- 7. compose countermotives and countersubjects.
- 8. compose real and tonal answers to given fugue subjects as well as counterpoint against answers.
