# SOCIOLOGY 310 FAMILY AND THE LAW FALL SEMESTER 2015 Wednesday 6:30 - 9:30 pm

The law is a profession dependent on precedent, on what has gone before and the established reasons why. Wet most lawyers would say it's also a creative profession, with room for new and novel arguments and for solutions that haven't been tried before.

**OVERVIEW:** Many contemporary scholars identify several principle areas as fundamental to the field of family law. First, family law addresses issues centered on the formation and dissolution of various family relationships, including marriage, divorce, child-parent and, more recently, procreation and alternative families. Second, family law governs the rights, obligations, responsibilities and consequences that flow from family relationships, including but not limited to parent and child, spouses, and other third parties, as well as medical decision-making, neglect and abuse.

**GOALS:** Students will have an opportunity to learn how family law is formed, interpreted and practiced, and how law emerges from the social fibers of our society, attempting to evolve as social standards, customs and technology evolves. Students will also learn how family law is impacted by both the U.S. Constitution and the Constitutions of the many States. Students are expected to read and understand the assignments, using analytical skills of legal reasoning. While some legal education will be helpful, it is not absolutely necessary.

**ATTENDANCE POLICY:** Please note that attendance in class is vital if you expect to do well. Students who do not attend class regularly receive lower grades. This is an upper-level four credit course and a lot of ground is covered in each class, since we only meet once a week. There may be times when an emergency (illness, family problem) may prevent attendance. In this case, you have the responsibility to contact me if you want to make up missed assignments.

Please be aware that daytime college events may not result in this class being cancelled. I will do my best to notify everyone via email in the event class is cancelled for any reason. Do not assume that if day classes are cancelled, evening classes are cancelled. You should read your email regularly and consult the college website, especially for weather-related cancellations.

**<u>ACADEMIC HONESTY:</u>** Students are expected to consult and follow the policies of the college as set forth in the current edition of the <u>Student Handbook</u>. Any student found violating these policies will be dismissed from the course and given a failing grade. Honesty is expected in all respects.

<u>CLASS PARTICIPATION:</u> <u>This is not strictly a lecture course</u>. It is very important for students to come to class prepared to discuss the principles set forth in the assigned reading material. Even though this class meets only once per week, the four course credits given dictate the amount of material to be covered. Remember the college rule of thumb – preparation time for the class should be at least double the amount of class time. <u>Class participation is 10% of your final grade so lack of attendance will result in a poor class participation grade.</u>

Students are expected to contribute to class discussions, to respond to questions and ask questions. All questions and comments are positive learning experiences for both you and I.

**<u>ENJOY</u>**! Knowledge increases with challenge. You will gain knowledge when you come to class prepared and use your life experiences in conjunction with what you learn. **ABOVE ALL, I WANT YOU TO THINK**! Open discussion and debate should make this class both challenging and enjoyable for everyone. If we work together, class will not be boring!

# **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

While I do not regularly deduct points on tests or the project for lack of familiarity with legal writing, I do expect an honest effort to use correct grammar and accurate spelling. Many professions still require good writing skills and computers do not always eliminate this need. I will deduct points if it is obvious that only a minimal effort is made in your work to pay attention to grammar and spelling. It is important that you learn how to convey your thoughts in a cohesive, easy-to-understand manner.
