Course Description: Beginning study of Spanish language and culture through textual, audio, and visual materials. Learning to function in culturally authentic situations and to perform with some proficiency in the four fundamental skill areas: reading, writing, listening, speaking. Designed to develop novice to novice-mid oral and written proficiency as defined by the American Council of Teachers of Foreign Languages.

General Description: This course is the first in a three-semester language sequence designed to help you achieve basic proficiency in Spanish by developing skills in reading, writing, conversation, and comprehension, and by broadening your cultural understanding of the Spanish-speaking world. By mid-semester, the course will be conducted primarily in Spanish and will cover chapters 1-5 of *¡Viva!*

Student Learning Objectives: By the end of this course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas: communication, cultures, connections, comparisons, and communities. Main objectives include:

Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events of the Spanish-speaking world.

Specific learning outcomes for the students are the following:

Introducing yourself Greeting and saying goodbye to friends Learning courtesy expressions Talking about yourself and others Spelling your name Identifying numbers Asking and telling time Describing your university and classroom Asking and responding to simple questions Describing yourself and others Talking about the calendar and weather Exchanging information about pastimes, weekend activities, and leisure activities **Time Commitment:** Students are expected to dedicate *at least* two hours of work outside of class per hour of class, for a *minimum* total of **6 hours per week.** You many spend more time than that to adequately prepare for class and complete assignments.

Policy on Late Assignments: Note that as a general rule for this class late assignments will be penalized and makeup exams or other work will be only given in **emergency situations.** If accepted, late homework assignments will receive a 10% penalty per late day.

Participation Expectations of Students

Active participation in class is crucial or increasing verbal competence in Spanish. Simply being present and taking notes does not constitute active participation. Students are expected to arrive prepared by having read the readings and completed all assignments. Class participation involves speaking in Spanish and collaborating in paired and group activities, completing in-class writing assignments and oral presentations, doing on-line preparatory work, and volunteering answers in class discussions. A positive attitude is expected and it makes a difference in your participation grade.

Speaking in English may be considered "negative participation" and results in a low participation grade. Even if you make mistakes, get frustrated, or have trouble when trying to communicate in Spanish, it will help your brain learn how to speak Spanish! Practice is the key to language learning. Students who demonstrate a willingness to communicate in the target language will receive "*pesos de participación.*" A high number of pesos will contribute to a high participation grade at the end of the semester. *¡Buena suerte, amigos!*
