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Course Prerequisite: Math 170 or its equivalent, such as the sequence Math 106-166

Course Goals and Content:

In this course you will be continuing your study of the mathematics of infinite processes. We will study advanced integration, elementary differential equations, and infinite sequences and series. You should gain

- a mastery over basic techniques of integration
- deeper insight into the power of calculus as a tool for modeling real world situations
- further expertise in using Maple as a tool for problem solving

The main content of the course is contained in Chapters 5–10 of the text.

Course Description

The course meets MWF 8:55-10:05 in Comenius 114. Homework assignments will be given at each class meeting. Students are expected to complete these assignments by the next class meeting, where they will be discussed. No one can learn mathematics without doing it themselves and so, **to the student, homework is the most important part of the course.** Since class participation is important, students are expected to attend every class.

Grading

Your final grade will be based on weekly quizzes (100 points), class participation (50 points), computer projects (about 100 points), 3 hourly exams (100 points each), and a comprehensive final exam (150-200 points). Exams may be in-class, take-home, or a combination of the two. Graded assignments must be turned in by the beginning of class on the date due to be graded without penalty. No assignment will be accepted after graded papers have been returned to the students. The following grading scale is used for assigning your final grade.

Attendance

Extra Credit

One goal for this course is to develop an appreciation of the beauty and utility of mathematics. To help foster this appreciation you should spend some time outside of class thinking and discussing mathematics.

There are no specific requirements for this portion of the course but many opportunities for you to earn extra credit. Some examples of such activities include: attending talks, giving a talk, reading a paper, or solving a problem.

Some typical examples include, but are not limited to

- attending an epsilon talk
- attending a Mathematics Colloquium at Moravian
- attending a math talk at another LVAIC school
- attending math talks at the Moravian College Mathematics conference in February
- attending math talks at the EPADEL conference in April
- solving a problem outside the scope of the class (5-infinite points)

If you attend an event relevant to your mathematical growth, then to earn extra credit you need to write a short paper that explains what the event was and how it deepened your appreciation of differential equations or mathematics. **For any talks you attend a write up is due within one week of when the talk was given. No extra credit points will be accepted after the second last Friday (April 29, 2016) of the term.**
