Catalog/Course Description:

This course provides an introduction to evidence-based clinical practice, with a particular emphasis on clinical nursing inquiry. Students are introduced to methods that guide inquiry, including how to search for information on best practices, discern levels of evidence that guide practice, and critically appraise research and formulate novel questions that may lead to additional research-based projects. Theory 3 hours weekly, 25 clinical hours over the term. **Prerequisite:** RN licensure in PA, admission to the nursing major, MATH 107 (Statistics), NURS 324 (Cornerstone of Professional Nursing). 1 unit/4 cr.

Objectives:

After completing requirements for this course, the student will:

- 1. Evaluate nursing's role in creating and maintaining an evidence-based practice environment.
- 2. Analyze research from nursing and other disciplines as a basis for practice.
- 3. Distinguish levels of evidence underlying clinical inquiry.
- 4. Apply research principles in an evidence-based practice project.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of legal and ethical issues related to research in health care.

Class Attendance/Participation:

Grading Policy:

Assignments are expected on or before their due date. Five points per day will be deducted from a graded assignment or project grade for each day late up to 5 days. After that time assignments/projects will not be accepted and will earn a grade of 0. All written assignments, including citations and references, must adhere to APA format. Students are expected to use refereed journals as primary sources in all assignments. All assignments require nursing/professional refereed journal articles from sources less than 5 years old. Students having any questions about grades must raise questions within two (2) weeks of the grade posting to Blackboard. No grades will be considered after this time.

Academic Integrity:

Evidence of plagiarism or academic dishonestly will be handled according to the college policy on academic honesty. This policy is described in the Moravian College Student Handbook. Plagiarism is the intentional use of another's words or ideas as your own. This can range from using another individual's direct words or changing the words without appropriate citation. It also includes obtaining a paper from someone else, the Internet, or a professional writing service.

Please be aware that the anti-plagiarism feature on Blackboard is turned on for all written assignments. I am using this feature in a collaborative spirit. My goal is not to catch people plagiarizing, but rather to eliminate any suspicion of plagiarism that could get in the way of our working well together! You can submit your paper up to four times for the originality score. Your first submission will come back to you (after being checked by the system) for your review. You will get an originality score- see section below (copied/modified from SafeAssign site). Address any problems that have been found and resubmit.

• Originality scores below 15 percent: These papers typically include some quotes and a few common phrases or blocks of text that match other documents. These papers typically do not require further analysis, as there is no evidence of plagiarism.

- Scores between 15 percent and 30 percent: These papers include extensive quoted or paraphrased material or they include plagiarism. Review these papers to determine if the matching content is properly attributed. Higher scores might also indicate that a student is/you are writing the paper by stringing together direct quotes: Do not do this (even if you had planned to include necessary/appropriate citations). Rather, try to paraphrase the material/say things in your own words to demonstrate that you understand the material.
- Scores over 30 percent: There is a very high probability that text in these papers was copied from other sources. These papers include quoted or paraphrased text in excess and need to be reviewed for plagiarism. If the paper was written by stringing a large amount of directly quoted material, appropriate citations or not, you will lose points from your final grade.
