# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Spanish 105 is the second level in a three-semester language sequence intended to help students achieve an intermediate low level of proficiency in the target language. It will cover chapters 6-10 of ¡Viva! Students will develop reading, writing, speaking, listening and comprehension skills, as well as broadening their cultural understanding of the Spanish-speaking world. The class is conducted entirely in Spanish.

<u>Pre-requisites</u>: Passing grade in Spanish 100 or placement by the Dept. of Modern Languages and Literatures. This course falls under the F3 category.

# **Course Objectives and Outcomes:**

The aim of the Introductory Spanish level program is to establish the basis of a life-long learning experience in the Spanish language, which will include the development of communicative skills and learning about the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. The material of study is divided into three semesters (Spanish 100, 105 and 110). By the end of the program, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas: communication, cultures, connections, comparisons, and communities. Main objectives include:

- Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns
- Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies
- Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language
- Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world

Specific outcomes for Spanish 105:

- Talking about and describing clothing preferences in a store
- Talking about how much things cost
- Saying what you bought
- Negotiating and paying for items you buy
- Saying and describing what you bought
- Describing your daily routine
- Talking about personal hygiene
- Telling where you went
- Reassuring someone
- Expressing likes and dislikes
- Expressing actions or states completed in the past

- Talking about food and ingredients
- Reading a menu
- Ordering food in a restaurant
- Finding out where you are
- Talking about people and places you are familiar with
- Comparing people, things, and situations
- Talking about a party or celebration
- Asking for the bill in a restaurant
- Expressing gratitude
- Leaving a tip
- Communicating in the past tense
- Describing how you feel physically
- Discussing health and medical conditions
- Discussing remedies
- Describing how, when, and where actions take place

# **Time Commitment**

Students are expected to dedicate *at least* two hours of work outside of class per hour of class, for a *minimum* total of 7 hrs./wk. You may need to spend more time than that to adequately prepare for class and complete assignments.

# **EVALUATION GUIDELINES**

#### Attendance.

- Just like playing an instrument or practicing a sport, language learning occurs best through active participation. Being present is the first step.
- You need to come to class and be on time. 0-3 absences will not be penalized, but may affect class performance. If you will miss class for a religious holiday, please let me know ahead of time so we can make arrangements for missed work.
- Every absence over three (3), for any reason, will result in a lowering of the final grade by one point for every additional absence. Exceptions may be granted only in extraordinary circumstances such as prolonged illness or family emergency; these situations may require additional documentation and are not automatically guaranteed. Travel plans are not considered extraordinary circumstances. The student would need to make arrangements to complete missed work.
- "The Academic and Disability Support Center is authorized to send e-mails informing instructors that students have valid excuses for not attending two or more consecutive

days of class. You may contact them by calling <u>610-861-1401</u> or sending an email to <u>disabilitysupport@moravian.edu</u>. Only if the Academic & Disability Support Center justifies extended absences, will they be excused."

- Arriving late (10 mins. or more) to class more than three times will equal one absence. Students who arrive 30 minutes late to an exam will not be given the opportunity to take the exam.
- It is the student's responsibility to complete assignments for missing classes. "I didn't do the homework because I was not in class" it's not an acceptable excuse! Please contact your instructor and/or a classmate to bring you up to speed.
- Students have the responsibility of keeping track of their own absences. **No reminders will be given!**
- Don't forget to turn off your cellular phone before coming to class. <u>If you insist in using your cellular (talking, texting, etc.) you will be asked to leave the classroom. This will result in an absence and a grade of 0 (zero) for that day.</u>

Compositions. Students will write 3 short compositions. Topics, guidelines, and instructions are on the *¡VIVA! Supersite Plus* Content – Activities - Grammar – Ampliación – *Escribir* section. The first draft will be written at home and revised by a writing workshop partner in class. Instructor will provide feedback. All final versions **must** be typed, double-spaced (min. 1- 1 ½ page long). See Course calendar for due dates. **Please do not send it via e-mail**. Be aware that content, vocabulary, grammar, mechanics, organization and completeness of task will be graded. Rubric will be provided in advance. Late penalty: 5% off per day (read POLICY ON LATE ASSIGNMENT below).

Chapter Tests and Written Final Exam. There will be a total of four chapter tests and one final exam. Each test including the final is *cumulative*; while each will focus on the material recently learned, it will also draw on material covered in previous chapters. NOTE: All chapter tests will be available on Supersite only on the date and time scheduled by instructor. All students must bring their laptops or iPads on test dates and complete their tests in class. No exceptions! Don't forget to bring your computers (see test dates on course calendar). If you don't have a laptop, you must make arrangements in advance to request one from Media Services <a href="http://cithelp.moravian.edu/">http://cithelp.moravian.edu/</a>

# Mid-Term

All students must give a group oral presentation in class. <u>Topics must be related to the Hispanic world or Hispanic cultures</u>. Students will have to work in groups of 3- 4 or 4-5 students, depending on class size. Together they will select a topic and notify their instructor at least two weeks before presenting in class. All members of a group must participate in the research part of the project and be ready to present their topic in class the date assigned. **NOTE**: You must work as a team! One evaluation per group and one grade for all the members of the group. The presentation will be graded as follows: content/information, organization, vocabulary, grammar and mechanics, pronunciation

and fluency, completion of task, team work, and ability to motivate classmates to participate during question/answer sessions. REMEMBER! At the end of each presentation, group members must test their classmates by asking them to answer at least 5 analytical questions about their topic.

At the end of the presentations, groups must turn in <u>neatly typed</u> the questions and answers prepared for class discussion, an outline for the presentation, and a list of works consulted and cited during the research (when preparing your "works cited" page, please use the Modern Language Writing Style (MLA Style): <a href="https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/747/01/">https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/747/01/</a>

**Duration of presentations: 10-12 minutes**, including the session of questions and answers. Specific guidelines and grading criteria will be provided by instructor in advance. Power Point or any other software presentation programs are highly recommended. If your group decides to use a software presentation program or any other presentation graphics package, **please** save your presentation on a flash drive or google drive – it will save us a lot of time.

**Final Oral Exam**. You will have the opportunity to demonstrate proficiency in spoken Spanish at the end of the semester. The evaluation will be based on fluency, accuracy, appropriate use of vocabulary and grammar structures, and pronunciation. You won't be able to use any notes. Every student will receive and individual grade. Specific guidelines and grading criteria will be provided in advanced. **The final oral exam** will be comprehensive (lessons 6-10) and will be given during the last class sessions (see course calendar).

# Things to remember about your **final oral Exam**:

- 1. You must have a partner (from class)
- 2. Oral exam will cover materials from lessons 6-10. Basically, you and your partner will have to be prepared to talk about/discuss topics related to these lessons (format: dialogues, interviews, plays, TV show, etc.). Be creative!
- 3. Instructor will provide a list of these topics for you and your partner to prepare outside of class
- 4. Instructor will select 3-4 topics from the list, the date of your oral exam. Be prepared!
- 5. Instructor will provide specific guidelines and grading criteria in advance
- 6. Exam will take about 8-10 minutes (per pair)

Remember that you should not copy the information from another source directly and read it. This is considered plagiarism. You should <u>use your own words</u> in this project. If you plan to use extra sources, they must be properly cited. Copying and reading information will result in a failing grade.

# FORMAT FOR ALL WRITTEN WORK

I will <u>not</u> accept work that does not follow these formats. This format applies to graded and non-graded writing assignments (example: typed compositions, written homework assignments, and any other in-class writing activity).

- Use smooth-edged paper (no spiral notebook tear-outs)
- Write NEATLY on every other line.
- Write QUESTIONS and answers. Answer in complete sentences unless otherwise directed.
- Clearly label each activity.

# Typed:

- Use **12 pt** Times New Roman or Arial.
- *Use double* space.
- Write QUESTIONS and answers. Answer in complete sentences unless otherwise directed.
- Clearly label each activity

# **Participation**

Active participation in class is crucial for increasing conversational competence in Spanish. Students are expected to arrive prepared to participate in all class activities by having studied the topics to be covered and having completed all assigned homework. Simply being present and taking notes does not constitute active participation.

Active participation involves speaking and collaborating in paired and group activities, in-class writing assignments, short oral presentations, doing on-line preparatory work, and volunteering answers in class discussions. **A positive attitude** is also expected and it makes a difference in your participation.

Participation should be in Spanish, even when speaking with another student. Chatting in English may be considered "negative participation" and will result in a very low participation grade. Speaking in Spanish, even when you make mistakes, get frustrated, or have trouble communicating, helps your brain learn how to learn Spanish. It's like a sport or playing an instrument—practice is key. **The class participation grades will be assigned as follows**:

- A= 95 or higher Excellent participation (the student answers questions and offers interesting comments without the need of the professor or the debate leader calling on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student has thoroughly prepared the assignment and has done the necessary background research to understand the reading/homework assignment).
- B= 85 Good participation (the student answers questions and offers interesting comments whenever the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. Sometimes, the student participates without being asked. The comments and answers show that the student has prepared the assignment and has done the necessary background research to understand the material quite well).
- C= 75 Fair participation (the student answers questions and offers comments only when the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student has prepared the assignment, but has not done much necessary background research to understand the material).
- D= 65 Poor participation (the student answers questions and offers very brief comments only when the professor or debate leader calls on him/her. The comments and answers show that the student has a poor preparation of the reading/ homework assignment and has not done the necessary background research to understand it).
- F= 55 Lack of participation (the student does not answer questions and does not offer any comments in the class or group discussion. The lack of comments and answers, as well as incorrect answers, show that the student has not done the reading/ homework assignment or, if he/she has done it, it has been in a careless or incomplete way).

No attendance, no participation at all (when a student is not in class, he/she gets a 0 for that day regardless of the reason for that absence).

**Extra credit** (to be added to total grade at the end of the semester): Students will have the opportunity to earn up to 5 points by participating in events approved by instructor. These extra credit events or activities will be announced in class. In order to receive credit, students must **actively participate** in some of the following events/activities:
